Quarterly Meeting
February 25, 1983
Shenandoah Inn, Old Washington, Ohio

The meeting was called to order at 8:05 P.M. by President Kolb. In attendance were 10 Board Members and 66 club members and guests from 5 states.

President Kolb announced the door prize would be an NCC cup plate and the prize for the Auction 'guesstimate' would be a Scottie book end.

The minutes of the November 6, 1982 meeting were read by Janice Hughes and approved.

The Treasurers report was given by Bill Smith showing the Operating Equity as of December 31, 1982 to be \$12,929.86 and the Museum Equity \$81,240.76.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

BY-LAWS: No report.

CONVENTION: Chairman Jo Barstow reported this will be NCC's 10th Anniversary and a special Convention is being planned. Volunteers will be needed. As the Museum will be open there will not be a Display room.

CRYSTAL BALL: Editor Peg Gotschall thanked everyone for the ads and articles.

MEMBERSHIP: Chairman Phyllis Smith reported we now have 1210 members. Since the increase in the membership fee, some are not renewing associate members.

PROJECTS: Chairman Willard Kolb reported he is still working with Imperial Glass Co. on the book ends. The NCC cup plate is being sold to more Pairpoint collectors than NCC members.

PUBLICITY: Chairman Jo Andrejcek reported the free publicity for the Show and Auction has been out since November. The Show ads will be sent in the next few weeks.

BUDGET AND FINANCE: Bill Smith reported the outlook for NCC is good. The books are now at the new Auditors.

MUSEUM: Chairman Bill Harbaugh reported the Museum will open on March 2, Wednesday through Sunday, noon until 4:00 P.M.

PROGRAM: No report.

COLOR BOOK: Joy McFadden reported slides and price sheets are being sent to the Study Groups for pricing.

AUCTION: No report.

FLEA MARKET: Chairman Larry Hughes reported the contracts will be mailed soon.

SHOW: Chairman Joy McFadden reported some con-

tracts and deposits have been returned and the deadline is March 15.

PUBLIC RELATIONS: Chairman Bill Smith reported they did the Sanford and North Miami Shows in Florida. Proceeds from the North Miami Show will be donated to NCC. They will be doing a show in Irwin, Pa. the last week in March.

OLD BUSINESS: None.

NEW BUSINESS: The following By-Laws proposal was discussed.

RESOLVED: that Article VII, Section 4, of the By-Laws of National Cambridge Collectors, Inc. be amended so that the first paragraph shall read:

"The Board of Directors shall consist of 12 members elected from the roll of active voting members. The term of office shall be for 4 years. A Director may not serve for more than 2 consecutive full terms nor more than 8 years in any 10 year period. Service of less than a full year but exceeding 6 months shall be considered a full year for the purposes of this limitation. A Director may serve the balance of the current term in which the preceding limitation is reached."

A motion was made by Dick Houston to place the above proposal before the membership.

By a show of hands, the motion was defeated.

President Kolb closed the nominations.

President Kolb thanked Ruby Landman for her years of service to NCC.

Mrs. Mary Welker presented 2 research books donated to the Museum by Jack & Sue Rettig.

The door prize was won by Jill Cherry.

The mini-auction realized \$15.50 for the Museum.

The Show & Tell and program on Auction glass was presented by Lynn Welker.

A motion was made by Virginia Houston to adjourn at 9:35 P.M.

It's time again to start thinking "Convention." I would like to see this one really be a smash as it is our "Big 10."

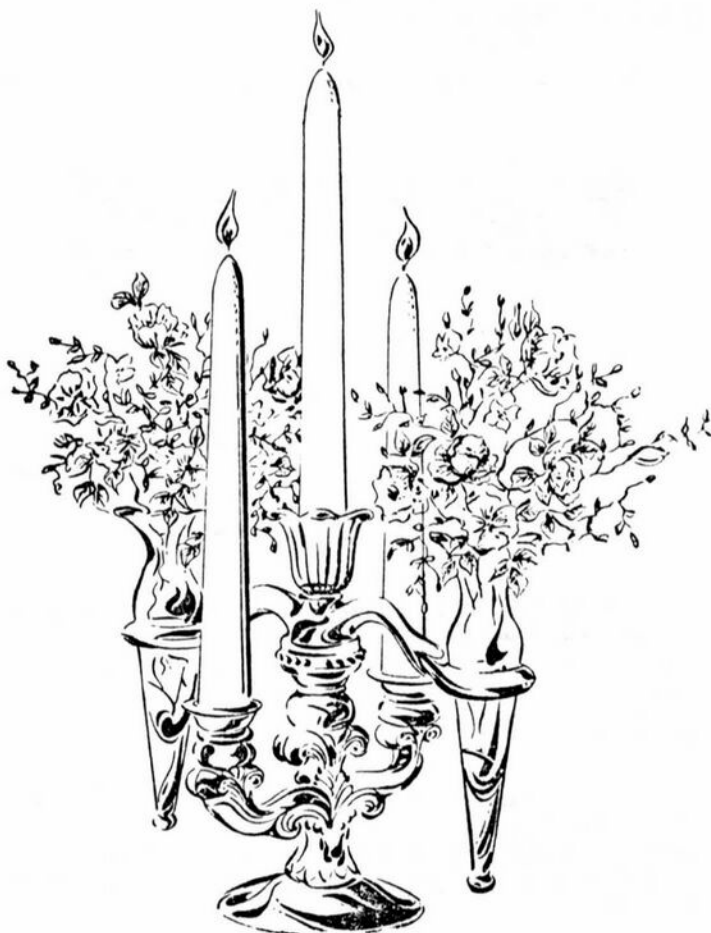

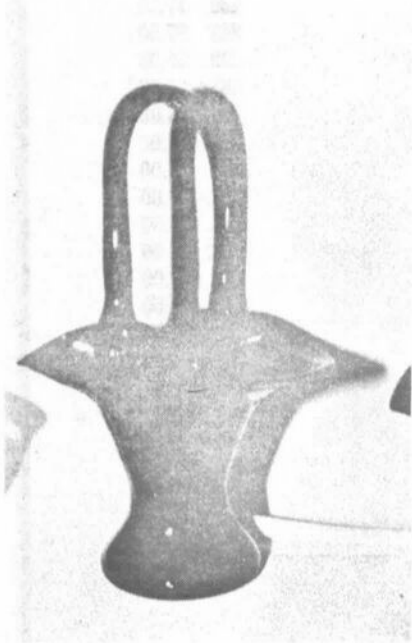
1983 AUCTION OBSERVATIONS

as reported by Joe Andrejcek

What does one do at 9:28 a.m. on a partly sunny, chilly Saturday morning in Old Washington, Ohio? One stands in line, waiting patiently for 9:30 and the opening of the 1983 all Cambridge Glass Auction. Then, at 11:20 on the dot (give or take 5 minutes) one sits with right arm raised along with approximately 125 other people while Auctioneer Craig Connelly and his able assistant, Dave Cobb, auction 295 lots of Cambridge Glass which included over 600 pieces of glass.

The Auction Chairman, Lynn Welker had earlier indicated some of the rarer pieces. A rare color combination No. 3111 gold krystal with amber stem and foot wines and cocktails sold at \$9 and \$8 each. A No. 119 rubina 10½ in. basket brought \$300, and the controlled bubble paperweight sold for \$50. The No. 494

Willow etched green enameled cup and saucer was rapped at \$60. A mulberry Community kerosene-type lamp sold at \$85, and a beautiful pair of ivory 9½ in. ball stem candlesticks with enameled flower baskets were sold for \$150. Three No. 3143 sunset 12 oz. Gyro Optic ranch tumblers brought \$72.50 each. A No. 2766 emerald 9 in. gold decorated Inverted Thistle-nappy sold at \$37.50 while the tumbler went for \$30. A No. 66 13 in. violet Caprice footed and crimped bowl cost a lucky collector only \$220. Everyone waited with Oohs and Aahs for the sale of a "one-of-a-kind" No. 1119 Eagle bookend made with a combination of crown tuscan and crystal. They were not disappointed. It sold to a very determined bidder for \$500 - not a bad price if you like eagles.

BEWARE OF NEW ROSE POINT

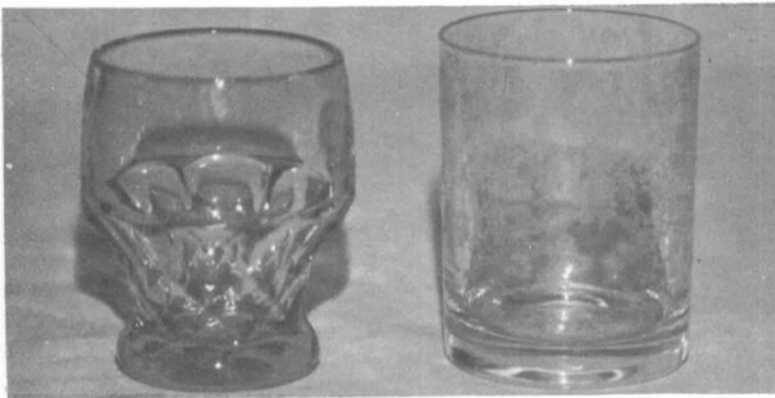
It has come to our attention very recently that Rose Point has been another of the victims of REPRODUCTION.

It is our hope that making you aware of this situation will assist you in protecting your collections and will also possibly prevent your becoming a victim of a difficult situation.

We have only seen one example of this "new" Rose Point. It is a nearly straight sided, flat bottom sham tumbler of approximately 12 ounce capacity. It has a "safety lip" on the top as opposed to the straight edges that would be found on a Cambridge tumbler. A safety edge is a beading, or slight build-up, of glass on the top edge of a vessel that is the result of having been melted slightly to smooth the edges. The quality of the glass is similar to the high production items that are produced by companies such as Anchor-Hocking or Libbey. The glass is definitely not of the quality that we normally associate with Cambridge. The measurements of this tumbler are: 4 1/8" high, 3 1/4" top diameter, and 3 1-16" bottom diameter. The thickness of the bottom is approximately 5/8"

The quality of the etching is a completely different story. It is an etching of very good quality, deep, sharp, and well done. We have tried to compare the etching on the tumbler that we now have with other examples of Rose Point, and have arrived at the conclusion that it does not appear to be from one of the Cambridge etching plates. Apparently it has been etched from a completely new plate.

There may be some hope for us in the volume of this "new" production. All of the information which we have been able to

gather seems to indicate that the production has been very limited. We now believe it to have included three different sizes of tumblers, the above mentioned 12 ounce, a larger tumbler of the same type with a capacity of approximately 16 ounces, and the third size being approximately 9 ounces. Quantity figures are in the realm of ten or twelve dozen 12 ounce, three or four dozen 16 ounce, and a very small number of the 9 ounce.

The numbers are relatively unimportant at this time, however, as the real problem lies in the fact that new production has occurred. At this point in time it is apparently only in tumblers. What might it be tomorrow? If an individual or a company has found an inexpensive means of creating these new plates and has found it financially beneficial to reap a profit from the Rose Point market, there would be no means available to us to prevent being taken-in by other examples of this work as well.

This instance of possible deception could very easily be compounded by situations of actually using Cambridge blanks in the new process and we would have no means what-so ever of protection. Hopefully, our being aware of the existence of these pieces will be of some help to us if and when we are approached with any offerings that are questionable.

Any further information on this subject would be greatly appreciated, so that all of our collectors can be informed.

CAMBRIDGE PRICES IN FLORIDA

On our recent trip to Florida we visited several antique shows, fleas, shops, etc. Thought perhaps you might enjoy hearing about the prices on Cambridge glass down there. Most were quite reasonable, some were on the high side, and others were even what we considered to be a "steal"! You can be the Judge! The most outstanding piece we saw was a lovely brown Owl lamp. The asking price was \$650. It was sold and we don't know what the final price was, but feel sure it wasn't much less, if any. At the same show there was a lovely light emerald green draped lady figure flower holder with a price tag of \$225, and an 8½" two-kid mocha or light amber flower holder for \$225. Amber is harder than most colors to find in these holders.

Has anyone seen any moonlight blue Caprice dinner plates lately? We saw a short stack of them and the price was \$82 EACH. They hadn't sold when we left the show, but we have no doubt they will sell and probably at the asking price or very close to it! You don't see them very often in the moonlight blue. Also saw Caprice flat tumblers at \$38 each and the thin blown stemware in the \$24 to \$28 range — all in moonlight. Caprice cups and saucers were \$38 per set. The large Tally-Ho hat was there in royal blue with a \$250 price tag. Tally-Ho stemware in the dark colors (royal blue, dark emerald, etc.) were priced from \$24 to \$32 each, depending on where you were looking.

At one show, a dealer had a beautiful display of willow blue

Decagon dinnerware in a nearly complete set of service for 12. They were asking \$1,800 for the approximately 130 pieces. This included, besides the common pieces such as cups, saucers, dinner, salad, and bread and butter plates (if these pieces can be considered "common"), such items as the gravy boat w/underplate, four-part relish, 15" platter, plus several different sizes in stemware, and other items we just can't remember. The set was broken up and sold by the piece. The gravy boat sported a price of \$60, the relish \$24, the platter \$20, and the stemware was in the \$18 to \$24 range.

There were a couple of Carmen No. 3011 (Nude stem) table goblets with \$125 and \$135 tags, and of course we can't complete a report on prices without making mention of the 80 oz. Ball Jug with Rosepoint etching for \$190.

Of course we will have to share our "steal" with you. How about finding 10 Cambridge Square cordials for \$25? That wasn't for each, that was for all! If you should doubt that was a great buy, just look up No. 122 on your Auction results (1983 All-Cambridge Glass Auction) and see what the two that were in the auction brought.

We are heading for Pennsylvania the end of March, so we will try to bring you a few prices from there next month.

CAPRICE SLIDE PROGRAM

The Florida Everglades Cambridge Study Group makes available its slide program "Caprice." This program currently consists of 103 slides with written narrative, and shows 149 different pieces of the Cambridge Caprice Pattern.

Caprice was produced by Cambridge Glass Company starting in 1936 and not ending until the final plant closing in 1958.

All slides are in color with the majority of the items shown in crystal. Each slide has its own narrative and the program takes from 1 to 1½ hours to present. The slides are in two top loading Kodak carousels, evenly divided to allow for a break during the program if so desired.

The narrative for each slide gives pertinent information regarding the Caprice items being shown. This information includes production dates, colors and other information of interest.

The slide program with narrative is available for rental to any glass or collectible club. The fee is \$25, payable in advance, plus return shipping charges. All proceeds will be used to buy glass for the MUSEUM of Cambridge Glass owned and operated by the National Cambridge Collectors Inc., Cambridge, Ohio.
