party for a couple of weekends so we can get started with cleaning, sorting and inventorying the molds and tons of other memorabilia that the storage building holds.

I am still finding items at the Imperial factory that came from Cambridge, storing them at home and will probably have to hire a large truck to get them to Cambridge. The greatest find was a "Hokey Pokey" press. wanted one of these from the very beginning, but could not find one at the factory. I found one under tons of scrap equipment and it is in pretty good working condition. Why do we want a Hokey Pokey press? Well, most of you have probably never seen a Nude stem or any other piece of stemware being made, where the stem is formed by glass being pressed upward through the mold. A blower blows the bowl into a paste mold and while both items are still hot they are attached at the top of the press up mold, the item is removed, a glob of hot glass is attached to the bottom of the stem and a finisher casts the foot of the piece of stemware. The main difference between this operation and a regular press mold is that the hot glass is dropped into the press itself rather than into the top of the mold. I have been told that this type of operation used about twice as many workers as a regular press shop. It's no wonder that fine stemware of this type is not being made today . . . the price is so prohibitive! Anyway, we think that a demonstrative setup of this in our Museum would be interesting.

Duncan & Miller Research Reveals a Treasure Trove by George A. Fogg

The following statement from Vol. XLIII, No. 3, February 19, 1931, under the column Pittsburgh. "The Cambridge Glass Co., of Cambridge, Ohio, has just received word from Washington that the Cambridge trade mark has been registered at the Patent Office and will be used marking all items of glass manufactured by the concern. The tendency to mark glassware appears to be growing."

From Vol. XLIV, No. 14, November 5, 1931, under <u>Pittsburgh</u> column the writer notes, "Arthur J. Bennett, president of the Cambridge Glass Co., and W. L. Orme, vice-president of the concern, are back at headquarters in Cambridge, Ohio, after an Eastern business trip."

We read from Vol. XLV, No. 14, May 5, 1932, again under <u>Pittsburgh</u>, that "Arthur J. Bennett, president of the Cambridge Glass Co., has gone to Atlantic City, N.J., where he maintains a home. The Bennett residence in Atlantic City has been closed all winter." Now there is a bit of gossip you really could not live without.

Out of the same volume, No. 25, July 31, 1932, comes this item of interest. At the conference in Atlantic City of manufacturers and workers, at the roll call Cambridge Glass Co. was represented by W. L. Orme and J. C. Kelly. There were lots of other glass companies, but I took out only Cambridge Glass Co. names.

Vol. XLVII, No. 15, May 11, 1933, <u>Pittsburgh</u>, at a meeting of the National Association of Manufacturers of Pressed and Blown Glassware J. C. Kelly represented the Cambridge Glass Co.

These few tidbits from the PG&BS (Pottery, Glass & Brass Salesman) telling what the various concerns and their personnel were doing. These trade papers helped keep the glass manufacturers up-to-date and in touch with what was happening in the glassware world.

New in Cambridge Showrooms

PART II

This is the second in the series of articles dealing with Cambridge advertising copy and descriptions of Cambridge wares taken from trade journal articles. These articles continue to supplement my presentation at the 1986 Convention. Bear in mind, if the source is an advertisement, complete sentences were not always used; hence the grammar or structure may or may not be complete or proper. None the less, this type of material makes for not only interesting, but also informative reading.

China, Glass and Lamps, February 1930 - "One of the newest and most appealing lines of special glassware to appear on the market for 1930 is the 'Springtime' line being introduced by the Cambridge Glass Co. Flower bowls, console sets, vases, etc. are included in the Springtime offering which is striking with its embossed design in clear glass which is emphasized by a frosted background. Another group from this factory features black glassware in artistic combinations on new and unusual shapes."

China, Glass and Lamps, January 1930 - "A study of the Cambridge line will acquaint the buyer with many pertinent facts. A product made by a responsible firm -- giving assurance of standard quality. A glassware line which offers opportunity not for one time sales, but cumulative sales and profits. An exhibit of accomplished realities in the manufacture of glassware in a galaxy of every popular color of arresting brilliancy and innate beauty -- with a deftness of design. Artistically correct as well as practical."

China, Glass and Lamps, January 1930 - "Naturally, one would expect to find some new and interesting items when calling at the sales rooms of the Cambridge Glass Company, 184 Fifth Ave., and in this respect, he will not be disappointed. This firm is showing some cocktail sets which are the last word in articles of this kind. Two of these are illustrated, one of which is square with footed tumblers to match. This carries an etching of a Grecian dancing girl, in varied poses, on all four sides. It is known as No. 1020-1021. The other shaker is the Moderne, with a new

double-lipped top. This is decagonal in shape, as is the footed and matching tumbler, and has an all-over etched design of climbing rose which is certainly attractive. Where desired, trays may also be had, either plain or with an attractive pattern. These sets may be had in colors of emerald, peach, willow blue, and amber, and the square shape is also made in ebony....It would be impossible to find more attractive cocktail sets than these by Cambridge."

China, Glass and Lamps, March 1930 - "This unusual aquarium has a bird in prominent position. It is etching No. 736 and is a product of the Cambridge Glass Co. Made in various colors."

China, Glass and Lamps, January 1937 - "Below is shown one of the Cambridge Glass Co.'s newest etchings, the 'Wild Flower.' It is made in a full line of stemware and flatware, as well as vases. The design may also be had in the same range of items in a gold encrustation."

China, Glass and Lamps, September 1939 - "Among the ten new pieces recently added by Cambridge Glass Co. to its popular Colonial line called the 'Mt. Vernon' are the ball jug, No. 95 with a capacity of 95 ounces; the three-part celery & relish, No. 200; and the 11-inch celery, No. 96."

Pottery and Glass Salesman, March 1940 - "The established beauty of the ever popular glass hat reaches the peak in attractiveness with this series of four delicate etchings - Rose Point, Blossomtime, Wildflower and Chantilly - from Cambridge Glass. Beautifully executed in fire-finished crystal with a hand rolled rim, the items are also available in plain, cut or engraved designs."

American Home, March 1941 - "Pristine --- Chaste Crystal in the Modern Manner. The flawless beauty of this creation derives from the pure form of its modern motif executed in the richer brilliance of famed Cambridge Crystal."

American Home, May 1941 - "Beautiful" as Bridal Lace. From a superb selection of exclusive Highlighted Etchings. The traditional beauty of the old Rose Point lace is here faithfully translated to the graceful forms of fine Cambridge Crystal. By a special

technique, Cambridge handcraftsmen capture in every delicate tracery a rich, luminous glow wholly unlike ordinary frosted etchings. Available in Rose Point, Diane, Blossomtime, Chantilly, Wildflower, Portia, Elaine, and Candlelight."

House Beautiful, November 1942 - "Cambridge Authentic Hand-Cut Rock Crystal. With a brilliance that rivals the fire of precious jewels, Cambridge hand cuttings bring to your table an atmosphere of noble luxury and true sophistication. Each design is a work of art, individually hand-cut on pure, graceful forms, created from Cambridge crystal. Although lavish in beauty, Cambridge cuttings are moderate in price. At good stores everywhere. Cambridge hand cuttings are perfect gifts, always appropriate, always cherished, always remembered."

Crockery and Glass Journal, February 1942 - "Minton Wreath----A challenge to ornateness in rock crystal cuttings is seen in this new, delicate handling of an old motif. Individually hand-cut in rich Cambridge crystal, Minton Wreath has proved to be as quickly saleable as it is entirely personable."

Ladies Home Journal, June 1943 - "Cambridge presents Arcadia Leaves of Ice Crystal Engrave Their Beauty on New and Lovely Shapes---Latest expression of America's supremacy in glass-making, Arcadia combines freshness and originality of form with an entirely new decorative treatment of finely engraved leaf patterns which give matchless sheen and brilliance to the crystal......"

Crockery and Glass Journal, April 1949 "When we saw the latest brain child being exhibited at the Cambridge Glass Co. at 212 Fifth Ave., NYC, we were simply enthralled. The display possibilities of these candelabras and epergnes were as numerous as the arrangements which can be concocted from the many handsome available parts."

China, Glass and Lamps, May 1949 - "An innovation in smart crystal table appointments has been introduced by the Cambridge Glass Co. under the name of 'Cambridge Arms.' The new glass includes two or more four-holder candlestick arms which can be joined by socket arrangement into as many as 30 different decorative combinations. In addition

to the use of candles, glass vases, sparkling prisms and peg-bottom nappies in which to float flowers also offer striking effects."

Better Homes & Gardens, December 1950 -"Where elegance is good taste---Cambridge etched crystal. Do you aspire to be a perfect hostess---with the finest of table appointments for your family and quests? Then, please do consider Cambridge Etched Of beauty rare, this exquisite Crystal. American handmade glassware is truly the crowning touch for festive settings, and the most appreciated of bridal gifts. The delicate lace-like designs are etched on clearest crystal and highlighted for extra brilliance. Choose from eight exclusive open stock patterns, (including the new Roselyn) available in complete settings, moderately priced."

Crockery and Glass Journal, April 1951 - "A delicate new etching called 'Daffodil' has just been brought out by Cambridge Glass Company....to go with the widely advertised silver pattern of the same name by Rogers Brothers. Daffodil is etched on the very modern 'Pristine' stemware shape and includes both tall and low goblets and sherbets and matching square plates.....'Sweetheart,' another new stemware line just out, is also modern in styling......"

Crockery and Glass Journal, January 1952 - "Daffodil, Newest of fine Cambridge Etchings. Daffodil is crystal in its loveliest, most elegant form. It is a new, fresh design aglow with brilliant light. And the graceful shapes make Daffodil especially appealing for fine table settings. Daffodil is among the royal family of Cambridge etchings......"

Can't you just hear the trumpets sounding as the "Royal Family of Cambridge Etchings" appears upon the scene, preceded of course by the "salteers and pepperettes" marching in formation!

Dear Phyllis -- As you can see by the enclosed article, we have lost our home and business. After this devastating fire it is doubtful if we will continue our business. You may use this article in our newsletter if you wish.

"FIRE CONSUMES ANTIQUES, BUSINESS

Only a portion of the Antiques were saved as fire destroyed a three-story former ice house that Elmer and Betty Puestow had called home.

"This is the first time in my 67 years I am completely broke," Elmer said while watching flames consume personal belongings and his home-furnishings business.

Lightning was blamed by firefighters for starting the blaze Thursday evening (7-24-86).

The collapsed building continued burning Friday. Assistant fire chief Frank Lewitzke said it was too risky to send personnel into the debris to clear away burning material.

The wood-frame structure was built in 1901 as the Kiefer Cold Storage Plant. Puestow and his wife used part of it for an antique and furniture business.

About 50 neighbors helped rescue more than 100 antiques from a shed before flames reached it. Also, about \$3,000 in antiques had been shipped Wednesday to a show elsewhere in town.

Puestow, estimating the loss at \$100,000, said he has fire insurance, but no ready cash."

Dear Phyllis -- I enjoyed your letter and my first issue of the "Crystal Ball." I find the work the NCC Members have done towards the museum is very interesting.

I am a new collector. My only interest is in Rosepoint. My first pieces came to me from my great aunt at the time of her death. At first I was not really interested and did not realize the value of the crystal.

After I was married and packed and unpacked the Rosepoint during our first few moves, I began to really see the beauty of the crystal.

"NEAR CUTS PREPARE FOR THE FOOTBALL SEASON"

Monday, August 16, 1909 . . . A meeting of Bennett's Near Cuts football team was held Sunday afternoon to transact business and organize the team for the coming season. Harry Motte, who so successfully managed the team last year, will probably hold the same position this season. Manager Motte has a large number of candidates for positions on the Near Cuts and will no doubt be able to get together one of the best teams in this section.

Last year this team won seven games and lost none. It is the intention of Manager Motte to get together a better and faster team this year and is carefully selecting his players. A number of football players with the High School team last season will be given a tryout and some will perhaps be permanent fixtures in the Near Cuts' lineup. Practice will start in a few days in order to open the season early.

Mr. Bennett in speaking of the matter stated that as yet the contract with the gas company had not been signed but that he anticipated no trouble in this respect.

The opening of the Byesville Glass factory was made necessary by the large number of rush orders now on hand at the Cambridge Plant which must be turned out as soon as possible, the local plant being handicapped because of an accident recently. When asked today whether the Byesville plant would be operated permanently Mr. Bennett stated that he hoped so. The work of repairing the damage caused by the accident at the Cambridge Plant is being pushed forward as rapidly as possible.

The Byesville Glass Plant has been idle for the past few years, but the machinery is in such condition that very little time would be lost once a decision to resume operations is reached.


