PRICING OF #1570 CHEESE PRESERVER

Prior to the demolition of the old Cambridge factory, a quantity of business and production records were salvaged from the office building. Among the files found was one containing correspondence dealing with the #1570 cheese preserver. This file was the basis for two previous articles (October 1990 and September 1991) that covered the history of the cheese preserver and customer complaints about its performance. This month's article consists of letters from the file that deal with pricing policies for special and regular customers.

The writing style may appear "odd" and at times it appears a word is missing in the transcription. However, the letters do appear just as the were originally written. The physical format has been changed in this transcription in that everything is left justified. This was not the case in the originals. Mr. W. C. McCartney was Corporate Secretary and Sales Manager while E.P Henn was the manager of the New York City Sales Office and Showrooms. Except when discussing retail prices, prices stated are for a dozen preservers.

June 4th, 1941

Mr. W. C. Mc Cartney Cambridge, Ohio

Dear Sir

As you remember, Bill, we raised prices on the #1579 Cheese Preserver and I think we certainly made a good showing in working out the deal, as you well know. However, this article is now cataloged by two of our better houses - Hammacher Schlemmer & Lewis & Conger - and they both tell us it would be disastrous to raise the price on this now. The item is difficult one to handle and it is costly to them, and you know the additional business their advertising created.

Don't you think we ought to go along with them at \$7.20 basis and advance the item to \$9.90 per dozen to general trade. I leave it to you but surely you can see where customers are reasonably justified in bringing this up. I understand U.S. is still making these. Is this true? If so, you know what will happen in the way of prices.

We have before us your letter of the 4th, which we discussed when you were here, concerning the #1570 Cheese Preservers for Hammacher Schlemmer and Lewis & Conger, who have catalogued the same.

As explained to you when here, in going over our costs we find we cannot continue the price of \$7.20 and this is one of the items on which the price must advance more than 10%, so for these concerns we're are going to suggest you make them a price of \$8.40 for the balance of the year, and when printing our new price list we will make our price \$10.20 a dozen to the general trade.

We trust this arrangement will be satisfactory and await your advice after interviewing them.

Dear Sir:

This is in regards to Hammacher Schlemmer and Lewis & Conger Companies relative to their using our #1570 Cheese Preservers.

We have made the following arrangements with them - that the very best price we can make them is \$8.80 per doz. They will retail article at \$1.95 each. To the regular trade we are going to sell these preservers at \$9.90 doz. Please see that your records are marked accordingly.

It was quite a job to convince Hammacher Schlemmer and Lewis & Conger on this price advance from \$7.20 to \$8.80 but we believe we have satisfied them on this score. Further, we believer they will both run this item again in this Fall's catalogue. Be sure to stick to \$9.90 per dozen for regular trade on lots of one dozen or more.

Trusting these arrangements are satisfactory to you.

We acknowledge receipt of yours of the 18th advising of the prices you have placed on the #1570 Cheese Preservers for Hammacher & Schlemmer and Lewis & Conger, as well as ourselves.

Your letter crossed ours of the 18th so we are just wondering if since receiving ours you still want to proceed as per your letter, or ours. Please advise.

We think \$10.20 is a better price for ourselves than \$9.90 Ten twenty is a cost price of 85 cents each, while \$9.90 is an odd price.

By the way, we cannot force our customers who buy

at \$10.20 to retail for \$1.95 They, no doubt, will be underselling Hammacher & Schlemmer, as our customers purchasing either at \$9.90 or \$10.20 could make a retail price of someplace between \$1.50 and \$1.75.

We await your advice.

Dear Sir:

Please refer to your letter of the 19th which is in reply to ours of the 18th advising what prices we intended placing on the #1570 Cheese Preservers for Hammacher Schlemmer and Lewis & Conger. It will be perfectly agreeable for us to accept your new plan of selling at \$10.20 per doz to the regular trade. However, we want to keep to the price of \$8.80 per dozen to Hammacher Schlemmer & Lewis & Conger.

You bring up the point that you cannot force customer who buys at \$10.20 to retail article at \$1.95. I can understand this but I really feel, Bill, that an article costing \$10.20 will be retailed, in most cases, at \$1.95 anyway. However, I am not too much concerned as to what outsiders retail it for, as long as I know they are paying \$10.20. I think I can safely keep our people in New York within line with Hammacher Schlemmer's retail of \$1.95. At least I am going to make an effort to, so you can do as you see fit in this instance and we will work out our own salvation over here in trying to get them to retail at \$1.95.

We hope that you have this straight now in that we will sell Lewis & Conger and Hammacher Schlemmer at \$8.80 - general trade at \$10.20.

COMMITTEE REPORT: ACQUISITIONS

Editor's Note: Last month, we debuted a new feature to educate the membership of the goings-on on our committees. This month, we interviewed Joe Andrecjak, the Acquisitions Committee Chairperson.

The Acquisitions Committee is on the lookout for special pieces to add to our Museum's permanent collection. The four person team includes Doris Isaacs, Lynn Welker, J.D. Hanes and Chairperson Joe Andrecjak of Lakewood, Ohio.

The top source of museum glass is donations but the Club has a small annual budget, usually around \$2,000 to seek out important additions. This past year they purchased from a private collection a pair of Carmen Everglades double candlesticks and a Carmen Nude stem Fruit Bowl and matching candlesticks. Also from a member, came a rare Caprice #1 goblet in Amethyst.

The Committee shops area antique shops and shows, our Annual Convention, and the March Benefit Auction. Last year, they bought a set of miniature opaque baskets (including Helio and Ivory) at the Auction. They'll surely be scanning this month's list for new jewels.

In terms of goals, the Committee is actively seeking etched color glass. Joe thinks the "supply is drying up" and they jump on pieces they find when reasonably priced. High prices are the toughest obstacle they face. But that's why they, like all of us, have to shop for the bargains. Once such buy was a Crown Tuscan Rose Bowl, etched Rosepoint.

A top source for funding is cash donations from members in memory of a loved one or a friend. If you'd like to leave such a rememberance, be sure to note on your contribution that it should be directed to Museum Acquisitions. Acquisitions made with memorial funds are noted with a placard in the displays at the Museum.

The best source of leads on Museum-quality glass is from our members. If you have something the Committee might want to buy, just jot them a note care of the Museum P.O. Box.



The Town Where You Live

SLEEPY HOLLOW, N.Y.

Just twenty five miles north of New York City sits a historic area along the Hudson River called the Sleepy Hollow region. It was made legendary by Washington Irving and his tales of the Headless Horseman of Sleepy Hollow. This legend makes hayrides during Halloween a continuing popular activity as kids of all ages take a scary tour of the Sleepy Hollow Cemetery and the surrounding hillsides.

The Hudson River communities north of New York from Tarrytown to Hyde Park offer spectacular views, cultural sites and restorations, Revolutionary War historical sites, and some good antiquing opportunities if you're willing to put some miles on your car or van. This area is strategically located in the Northeast U.S. Within four hours, you can be in Washington D.C.to the south or New Hampshire to the north. It makes "roadtripping" for Cambridge Glass a fun activity if you've got sunglasses, bottled water, and good maps! This time of year a good set of snow tires is highly recommended.

In the immediate area, there are nearly a dozen Depression Glass shows each year. Many of these shows are on sequential weekends and are populated by some of the same dealers, so you see a lot of the same glass. However, each show, has "fresh" dealers, so I rarely fail to pick up some piece of Cambridge at each. Most of the promoters have both a fall and spring show.

The notable shows are Allendale N.J. (North Jersey DG Club), the Connecticut Heisey Show (has some really good Cambridge!), Long Island Depression Glass Show (twice a year with different dealers, they also have an annual December auction), and Hudson Valley Glass Club (located in a firehouse in quaint Millbrook, N.Y., a good antique and craft town). Southington, Ct., outside Hartford, has three shows a year including Cookie's one-day outdoor show in August with over forty glass dealers! There are also three or four Queens N.Y. shows (at the

Botanical Gardens and the Adria Motor Inn on Northern Boulevard).

You can find good glass at these shows. My favorite find this year was a Moonlight Blue Caprice spittoon at the Spring Hudson Valley Show. (With apologies to Dennis Bialek and Larry Thompson who generously did not buy the piece before the doors opened and I had my shot.)

The antique centers in the immediate vicinity are just fair. Even though our home county of Westchester is populated with executives who commute to NYC, there are very few quality antique malls of note. Tarrytown is trying to become an antique town, with eight to ten shops, but the quality really isn't there. I hit the shops every two weeks and often come home empty handed. I did once score the rare Shawnee Mugsey cookie jar for another of our collections.

Some good nearby shopping is across the river at the thrice yearly Nyack Street Fair and down at the Jersey Shore (Red Bank, Pt. Pleasant). But, we'll let Bud Walker discuss the Shore towns in a future article. OK, Bud? Other notable New York malls are in Hyde Park, Hopewell Junction, Rhinebeck, Ulster County, and in Ridgewood, Ct. To hit the best shops you must travel a bit to New Hampshire, Vermont, and Maine. These make great three day weekend trips with some terrific bed and breakfasts. The Fall is the best time, when the colors changing are extraordinary. Better make reservations, though, as Fall color trips are very popular.

Flea markets remain a great way to find Cambridge and the Northeast has the granddaddy of them all ... Brimfield, Massachusetts. If you've never been, it's an amazing event .. a week long extravaganza with new fields opening at sunrise most every day. This is where the dealers shop.

You can find good glassware as well as general line antiques, advertising, furniture, you name it. Sometime, you've got to make the trip to Brimfield!

Also, look up the Stormville N.Y. market on Holiday weekends. It opens on a Sunday but the early buyers hit it Saturday afternoon during set up. Other good outdoor shows are in Stafford Springs and Farmington Ct. Outside Philadelphia, you'll find the Lambertville N.J. Flea Market and the famous New Hope/Bucks Co., Pennsylvania antique area.

One of my favorite days is Wednesday when our Antiques and The Arts Weekly paper arrives. Its over 200 pages each week and highlights the shows and auctions from Pennsylvania to Maine. Nearly half the paper is auction ads! Many dealers hit two-three a week to keep up their inventory. My biggest beef is that the auctioneers usually just list Depression Glass and don't specify what kind. I like to know if there is Cambridge so it is worth the trip!

Collecting is so much fun, the shopping can be tedious but its very enjoyable, particularly when you get THE BIG SCORE. We've built good Caprice, opaque, and Everglades collections by shopping

this area, but it takes effort and a true love for Cambridge Glass.

Editor's Note: As part of our ongoing education commitment, we welcome readers' contributions on The Town Where You Live. Part of education is not only the history behind the glass you find, but where and how you find it. Collecting is fun, it's a labor of love for most Cambridge collectors.
