## President's Message

# **Embrace Change: It's Good for You**

I voted in a historic election yesterday. My town of North Tarrytown, NY, voted 2-to-1 to change our name to *Sleepy Hollow* in recognition of the legendary heritage of the Headless Horseman. Washington Irving wrote the classic *Legend of Sleepy Hollow* about North Tarrytown. He is buried here in Sleepy Hollow Cemetery just outside our neighborhood.

Our story received a lot of national attention and much of the coverage's focus dealt with resistance to change. In 1988, a similar referendum was defeated by a nearly identical 2-1 margin. Despite its historical significance and the economic benefit the change will mean, many citizens said they didn't want change.

What's different now? It took an extraordinary event. Our major commercial industry has been a General Motors plant. After years of speculation, the plant was closed in June. It was our number one contributor to our town's tax base. (Cindy and I think we're #2 or 3!) The citizens last night voted for economic reinvigoration and a new future identity. They voted for change.

Change is a good thing. But, it is best when it is evolutionary and is initiated on your terms, *before* you have to (like my town did with the GM closing).

Much of what I have written about in the *Crystal Ball* over the last several months has been regarding change. If we want to survive and grow, we must embrace change. Change is good when it is paced and follows a plan. We began such a plan with our multiyear focused NCC 2000.

Here are some changes coming out of this planning process and our normal evolution:

We want to be more inclusive, get more volunteers, and avoid factions.

We need to be realistic about our goals to expand or relocate the Museum. We must tailor our dreams to more mirror our means.

We want to get more serious about raising funds and make our money work harder for us. We

established a separate Building Fund and invested it in more aggressive Mutual Funds. It's working.

We want an endowment program. It's now being reviewed by our club attorney and a member who is an attorney. We should be able to announce the program in the new year.

We want to provide more benefits to new members.

We want to build attendance at the convention and make first-time attendees feel welcome.

We need to build our regional presence and involvement. Members are our lifeblood.

We'd like more glass donations for the Museum. Our goal should be to be 100%-owned glass.

We need to welcome and embrace other glass clubs. We should encourage sharing information (as was done at November's quarterly meeting).

We should be seen as a *national* club, although our roots and heart and soul will always be in Cambridge.

Our fundraising projects should raise serious money and not run the risk of disappointing members.

Our books must be of high quality and meet the dual need of educating the membership and helping support the Museum through sales.

We should meet our members' inquiries swiftly and accurately. We rebuilt our staff and systems this year and should continue to improve.

Let's have technology work for us. New accounting and transmittal systems are in place. We should be on the Internet in 1997. We should have e-mail communication at the Museum.

Multiyear memberships are now offered and new membership initiatives are in planning phases. We vigorously survey non-renewing members to find our why. We will continue to change and evolve to better meet our members' needs.

# Out of the Past

#### by Mark Nye

From time to time while researching Cambridge Glass, I come across articles and other items that, while unrelated to Cambridge, are interesting to read. For the most part, they all involve glass, its manufacture or decoration and as such are indirectly related to Cambridge. Some are quite lengthy, taking several issues to reprint, while others are short, sometimes only a few paragraphs in length. Thus we start a new column that will appear from time to time, as space permits, and will feature reprints of some of these articles that I feel will be of interest to many Crystal Ball readers. Your comments on this new feature would be appreciated. The initial article is taken from the December 11, 1902 issue of Crockery and Glass Journal. As you begin to read it, keep in mind "lamp" refers to a kerosene lamp, not a gas fixture nor the electrical lighting device we call a lamp today.

#### The Lamp as an Ornament

"Even though it be admitted that this is indubitably the age of gas and electricity, and in the face of all modern appliances with artistic arrangements of bulbs and burners, the fact still remains that as a means of decorative lighting, lamps are still at the front. And surely it is no wonder when the beauty and grace of the designs are taken into consideration, for they make a decidedly attractive bit of furnishing, no matter in what room they find a place. Some householders have a most reprehensible habit of placing them between the lace draperies in the front window of the parlor. In such a position they mean nothing, and they are as out of place as would be a chiffonier in place of a sideboard or cabinet in the dining room, or a brass bedstead in the parlor.

"It always suggests advertising when one sees a lamp in this position; or it is merely the proud possessor's way of letting her neighbors know that she has a lamp, that same article being a sort of passport to gentility?

"Usually the window-stationed lamp is a much frilled, much ruffled shaded affair of showy pattern and style, which serves the purpose of furnishing, but never suggests use. Perish the thought! Utilitarianism in the parlor! Who ever heard of such a thing? Lamps, like the traditional children, must be seen. That is their mission, in the house where the

permanent abiding place is the parlor window.

"But in spite of all that, the fact that lamps have of late grown steadily in popularity is a sign of the increasing national instinct for beauty. The flicker of gas and the hard, uncompromising glare of the electric light have alike proven trying to many whose sense of tone values in light is too fine to be satisfied with crudities.

"The warm, subdued tone of the shaded lamp easily places it in advance of all rivals, while even in the daytime a handsome lamp is as distinctly an ornament to a room as any article of bric-a-brac.

"The manufacture of lamps has increased to a wonderful degree, and they are growing in beauty constantly. There are today exclusive large lamp stores in almost every city of size, their wares being among the most beautiful and attractive of any store which makes a specialty of artistic things.

"As far as light goes, the large lamps give a most brilliant, steady light, which is toned and softened by the shades to any degree that may be desired and the manufacture and proper use of chimneys has developed into a science which few persons understand.

"The great bugbears about lamps are the chimneys and wicks; on these and on the kerosene odor depends the objection. But all of these may be easily overcome. Take the chimneys for instance. A perfect chimney for any lamp should be as large in diameter as the brackets of the burner will permit; it should be as high as convenient, and not too narrow at the top. This insures a good draught, which helps make a clear, steady flame, without smoking, unless, of course, the wick is turned too high and renders it less likely to crack from the heat of the flame.

"Contrary to the almost universal idea, lamps are by no means an expensive luxury, unless one buys a very costly or antique relic to begin with, and the cost of maintaining a lamp in daily use is not more than one-eighth that of any other illumination. Besides, and what is more important, it is the only true artificial light which does not injure one's eyesight. Soft and untiring, steady and mellow, it is most grateful to the eyes. The person who has to read, write or sew by artificial light should use a lamp

(OUT OF THE PAST - Continued from page 4) in preference to any other light.

"For the best colors in globes, which, by the way, have almost superseded the ballet skirted shades, yellow or white give the best results, and for use the plan and better than those with designs, no matter how artistic, upon them. Green is much used by students, but it is not effective; the area of illumination is circumscribed, and no lamp can show to advantage by daylight when hooded in the dark shroud of opaque green glass.

"Yellow gives a beautiful golden glow like sunlight, and is most effective in any room, while the paler light of the white globe is the softer light of the moon. There are rooms in which red globes are appropriate, but, unlike yellow or white, they cannot be successfully used in all places.

"Lamps, from a sanitary point of view, are not nearly so objectionable as is popularly supposed and are, as a matter of fact, not so injurious as gas. The latter is extremely detrimental to plant life, whereas lamps are not. Florists know this well, and gas is not found in the hothouses and greenhouses whence come the floral riches of a city's market; they use kerosene lamps altogether.

"There are numberless styles of burners on the market, and the most serious trouble is with the wicks. This is, indeed, a crucial test of patience to the housewife or the maid who has the care of the lamps. Rewicking, which is necessary so often, and which, as a rule, is not done half often enough; the care of the wick, rubbing off the charred portion every morning, and seeing that it does not fall upon the burner, or if it insists upon so doing that it is promptly and properly removed; the caring for the gummy substance which will form on the tubing about the wick, these are exasperating trials of patience and skill, and all of them may be overcome by following a few simple common sense rules so that almost any lamp may be made to give satisfaction.

"In the first place, the wick space should be perfectly straight and even so that the wick will not bind anywhere but can be raised with ease and to an even height all around. This is necessary to make an even flame which will not smoke at any point. When a lamp does not permit all the wick to roll up evenly there is some fault with the wick space. Have it remedied at once, or buy a new burner. Do not try to 'get along' with it; it is demoralizing to both the temper and the eyes.

"Then see that the draught supply is adequate and perfect, and will support a large flame. After that do not neglect to see that the reservoir is at least two-thirds full of oil. Many and many a time a lamp is blamed for giving poor light when it has not enough to feed on. Nothing can work without sustenance, not even a lamp."

We look forward to next season and hope to meet many more NCC members.



#### CONSTITUTION

#### ARTICLE I-NAME

Section 1 The name of this organization shall be the National Cambridge Collectors, Inc., operating as a non-profit organization under charter granted by the state of Ohio.

#### **ARTICLE II - OBJECTIVES**

Section 1 The members of this organization shall meet together regularly, for the purpose of acquiring a broader knowledge of glassware manufactured by the Cambridge Glass Company in Cambridge, Ohio (1901-1954) and through instruction, discussion and study, actively promote the preservation and collection of Cambridge Glass.

Section 2 The primary objective of this organization is to establish and maintain a permanent museum in Cambridge, Ohio (Guernsey County) for displaying and study of Cambridge Glass. The organization will operate on a non-profit basis and all Moines realized will be applied to this end.

#### **ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP**

Section 1 There shall be two kinds of membership, namely voting and honorary.

Section 2 Voting Membership. Any person, age 12 or over, upon payment of the prescribed yearly dues is eligible to become a voting member of this organization. Other qualifications shall be as stated in the by-laws.

Section 3 Honorary Membership. Any person who has distinguished himself in an unusual and praiseworthy manner in promoting the objectives of this organization may be elected to honorary membership. Honorary members shall have the privilege of attending all meetings of the organization, but shall not be required to pay dues, or be permitted to vote or hold elective office, and they shall have no interest in any funds or property of the organization.

Section 4 No territorial limits shall be established for the organization and membership is open to all interested persons.

#### ARTICLE IV - MEETING AND FISCAL YEAR

Section 1 Regular meetings shall be held as provided in the by-laws.

Section 2 The annual meeting shall be held as provided in the by-laws.

Section 3 The fiscal year shall begin the first day of January each year.

#### **ARTICLE V - OFFICERS**

Section 1 The officers of this organization shall be a President, One Vice President, a Secretary and a Treasurer elected from the Board of Directors by the Board of Directors. All Officers shall hold office for one year, or until their successors are elected and qualified.

#### ARTICLE VI - BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1 The Board of Directors shall consist of 12 Directors elected by the voting members of the organization. Terms of the office are to be as provided in the by-laws.

Section 2 To be eligible to serve on the Board of Directors, a person shall be at least 21 years of age.

Section 3 The Board of Directors shall be the governing body of the organization and shall have power to make such regulation and take such action, not inconsistent with the Constitution and By-laws as, in its judgment, may be necessary for the welfare of the organization. The decisions of the Board in all organization matters shall be final, subject only to appeal to the voting membership of the organization.

#### ARTICLE VII - SURRENDER OF CHARTER

Section 1 If this organization deems it desirable, by unanimous vote of the active voting membership, to terminate operation of this organization, all assets, records and Moines shall be turned over the Guernsey County (Ohio) Historical Society with the stipulation that such be used only for the study and preservation of Cambridge Glass. In the event the Guernsey County (Ohio) Historical Society cannot, or will not, comply with above stipulation, it shall be turned over the Coming Museum of Glass, Corning, New York, to be used at it's discretion.

## ARTICLE VIII - AMENDMENT OF CONSTITUTION

Section 1 This constitution may be amended by a majority vote of the active members in good standing, present at the annual meeting of the organization, upon proposal by a voting member in good standing sixty days prior to the annual meeting, provided written notice of such proposed amendment shall have been given to members at least ten days prior to annual meeting.

## ARTICLE IX - ADOPTION OF THE CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

This Constitution shall take effect and be in force upon its adoption.

#### **BY-LAWS**

#### **ARTICLE I - MEETINGS**

Section 1 Regular Meetings. The regular meetings of the organization shall be held during the months of March, June, August, and November at such time and place as the Board of Directors shall designate.

Section 2 Annual Meetings. The annual meeting shall be held in June for installation of elected directors, the presentation of annual reports and transaction of other business. The term of directors shall officially begin at the close of business of the annual meeting. Charter directors shall hold office until their respective terms end, as per Article VII, Section 4 of the by-laws.

Section 3 Special Meetings. Special meetings of the organization may be called by the President or by a majority of the Board of Directors upon regular written notice to the Secretary at least five days in advance of said meeting.

Section 4 Quorum. The majority of the active members in good standing present shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the organization.

Section 5 Rules of Order. Parliamentary procedure in all meetings of the organization, Board of Directors, and Committees shall be in accordance with the latest revised Robert's Rules of Order if not inconsistent with the by-laws.

#### **ARTICLE II - DUTIES OF OFFICERS**

Section 1 President. The President shall appoint all Committees, shall preside at all meetings of the organization and the Board of Directors, and shall perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to such office. The President shall be ex-officio member of all committees except the nominating committee. He shall, immediately upon taking office, appoint a Sergeant-at-arms.

In the event a vacancy exists in the office of President, the Vice President shall assume the office and title of President during the unexpired term of the President. The President shall furnish bond in the amount determined by the Board of Directors, the cost of which bond shall be paid by the organization.

Section 2 Vice President. The Vice President shall have the duty of familiarizing himself with all organization affairs. He shall work under and in cooperation with the President and shall preside at meetings in the absence of the President.

Section 3. Secretary, It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep the official record of all members, voting and honorary, provide verification of voting members as required, record the attendance at meetings of the organization, record and preserve the minutes of such meetings, make the required reports, and perform such other duties as customarily pertain to such office.

Section 4 Treasurer. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to have custody of all funds, accounting for same to the organization at its annual meeting and at any other time upon demand by the Board of Directors and to perform such other duties as pertain to this office. He shall collect all dues and funds of the organization and deposit them in bank or depository named by the Board of Directors. Upon his retirement from office, he shall turn over to his successor or to the President, all funds, books and accounts, or any other organization property in his possession. The Treasurer shall furnish bond in an amount determined by the Board of Directors, the cost of which bond shall be paid by the Organization.

Section 5 Salary of Officers. All the officers shall serve without compensation.

#### ARTICLE III - BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1 Meetings. The President shall be Chairman of the Board. He shall call regular meetings of the Board at least quarterly. He shall call a special meeting within five days after receiving a written request from three or more board members.

Section 1 Functions (a) The Board shall be responsible for the appropriation of all funds of the organization and shall, through the President or other duly authorized member of the Board, approve all vouchers before payment by the Treasurer. It shall designate the bank or depository in Guernsey County, Ohio for funds of the organization, approve all investments of funds of the organization and determine the amount of the bond which shall be given by the President and Treasurer. It shall receive and approve Budget and the annual audit of the financial transactions of the organization. (b) It shall pass on all projects recommended by the Project committee, which must be approved by a two-thirds vote of the entire Board. (c) It shall pass upon all grievances. defaults and complaints by or against a member, and may take such action as it deems appropriate on behalf of or against such member. It may, for good cause, declare an office vacant, upon two-thirds vote of the entire Board. (d) It may fill vacancies that occur during the year. The President shall appoint, and the Board confirm by a two-thirds vote of those in attendance, a member to fill any vacancy occurring. Said appointee shall serve for the balance of the term being vacated.

Section 3 Quorum. A majority of the members of the Board shall constitute a quorum.

Section 4 Resignation of Board members. All resignations from the Board, except for those covered under Article X, shall be made in writing to the President.

#### **ARTICLE VI - APPOINTED OFFICERS**

Section 1 Sergeant-at-Arms. The President, immediately upon taking office, shall appoint a Sergeant-at-Arms. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms to preserve order at all times and perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to this office.

#### **ARTICLE V - COMMITTEES**

Section 1 The President shall appoint the following standing committees: (1) Membership, (2) Project, (3) Program and Entertainment, (4) Budget and Finance, (5) Publicity, (6) Convention, (7) Study Group Advisory, and (8) By-Laws.

Section 2 Special Committees. In addition to standing committees, there shall be appointed by the President, such special committees as the President and/or the Board of Directors may deem necessary.

#### **ARTICLE VI - DUTIES OF COMMITTEES**

Section 1 Membership. This committee shall promote activities designed to increase membership and shall perform such additional duties as specified by the Secretary in maintaining the records of membership.

Section 2 Projects. This committee shall devise and consider suitable and appropriate projects and shall devise ways and means whereby definite interpretation of the aims and objectives of the organization shall be given expression. It shall take cognizance of all matters of civic or similar nature and recommendations of the Project Committee shall constitute the basis for consideration of all projects of the organization.

Adoption of a project shall require a two-thirds vote of the entire Board of Directors.

Section 3 Program and Entertainment. This committee shall arrange and have charge of all programs for the regular meetings of the organization. They shall also have charge of all social functions of the organization, as may be directed by the Board of Directors.

Section 4 Budget and Finance Committee. This committee shall prepare a budget of the estimated income and expenses of the association for the year. In the month of May, each year, the Finance Committee shall cause a review of the books to be made by a licensed, Certified Public Accountant, and such statement shall be read to the organization at its annual meeting.

Section 5 Publicity. Publicity Committee shall be responsible for supplying notices concerning the organization meetings to the news media, and further, shall disseminate all interesting information furnished them by officers of the organization, chairmen of various committees. They shall also furnish the editor of the organization newsletter with news items for publication therein, promptly while it still has "news value".

Section 6 Convention. The Convention Committee shall have responsibility for all activities conducted during the annual Convention.

Section 7 Study Group Advisory. The Study Group Advisory Committee shall maintain official record of the activities of approved study groups. They shall furnish assistance and guidance to the study groups including, but not limited to, suggested topics for meetings, group projects, and research activities. They shall further, make newsworthy information and current listings of contact representatives available to the Publicity Committee.

Section 8 By-Laws. The By-Laws Committee shall review and make recommendations to the Board of Directors regarding needed or proposed amendments to the Constitution and or By-laws. This committee's activities will best reflect the changing needs of the organization.

#### ARTICLE VII - ELECTION OF DIRECTORS

Section 1 (a) The Directors of the organization shall be elected by mail, prior to the annual meeting each year. (b) At the regular meeting six months prior to the annual meeting, the President shall appoint a Nominating Committee of at least three members. The chairman shall be the immediate past president, then an active member of the organization. Should the immediate past president be unable to chair this committee, the Board of Directors shall appoint a chairperson selected from the committee. (c) At the regular meeting three months prior to the annual meeting, the Nominating Committee shall present a report, giving the number of Directors to be elected and presenting one or more nominations for each vacancy, at which time additional nominations will be entertained from the floor. (d) The consent of all nominees must be obtained prior to his/her nomination.

Section 2 (a) At least 30 days prior to the annual meeting, a ballot containing all nominees for Board vacancies, will be mailed to the entire voting membership. This ballot must be returned to the National Cambridge Collectors, Inc. no later than 7 days prior to the annual meeting. (b) The results of this ballot shall be announced at a

membership function prior to the annual meeting. (c) The nominees receiving the largest number of votes so cast shall be declared elected for the term of office beginning at the close of business of the annual meeting.

Section 3 Election of Officers. Officers shall be elected as provided in Article V of the Constitution. (a) This shall occur at a special meeting of the newly established Board of Directors, at a time which shall not exceed 30 days after the annual meeting. (b) All nominees for office must have previously agreed to accept their nominations. (c) Officers shall assume duty immediately upon their election.

Section 4 The Board of Directors shall consist of 12 members elected from the roll of active voting members. The term of office shall be for 4 years.

To provide for continuity of operations the original Board of Directors shall serve for the following terms:

3 persons for 1 year March 1973 to May 1974

3 persons for 2 years March 1973 to May 1975

3 persons for 3 years March 1973 to July 1976

3 persons for 3 years March 1973 to July 1977

#### **ARTICLE VIII - MEMBERSHIP DUES**

Section 1 Annual membership dues shall be as determined by the Board of Directors.

Section 2 Family Member. Each additional household member is eligible to become a voting member upon payment of prescribed dues per year.

Section 3 When payable. All dues shall be payable when billed by the Treasurer. No member shall be deemed in good standing who is in arrears more than 30 days in the payment of his dues.

## ARTICLE IX - RESOLUTIONS AND SUBSCRIPTIONS

Section 1 No resolution or motion to commit this organization on any matter shall be considered by the organization until it has been considered by the Board of Directors. Such resolution or motions, if offered at an organization meeting, shall be referred, without discussion, to the Board, which after having given consideration to the matter shall submit its recommendations to the organization. Having received the recommendations of the Board, the organization may then proceed to take such action as may deem proper to the majority.

Section 2 No assessments shall be permitted to be placed upon the membership of the organization, neither shall any person nor organization be permitted to appeal for funds for any purpose whatsoever before a regular meeting of the organization.

#### ARTICLE X - TERMINATION OF MEMBERSHIP

Section 1 Resignation. Resignation of any member when delivered in writing to the President or Secretary shall become effective immediately upon its acceptance by the Board, providing all indebtedness of such member to the Club has been paid.

Section 2 Non-Payment of Dues. Any member owing dues or otherwise indebted to the organization for a period of 30 days from the date when same becomes due and payable may be suspended and deprived of all privileges of the organization. If he applies for reinstatement within sixty days from the date of such suspension and pays all amounts owing to said date, the Board of Directors may, in its discretion, reinstate the member to good standing, otherwise he shall stand dropped from the roll of members.

Section 3 Misconduct. Any member who by personal or business conduct violates the principles or ethics of the organization may be expelled from membership by the Board of Directors by a two-thirds vote of the entire Board, at a meeting called for that purpose, provided that said member shall have been given ten days notice in writing of such

pending action together with a copy of the complaint against him, and shall be given an opportunity for a full and fair hearing.

#### ARTICLE XI - AMENDMENT OF BY-LAWS

Section 1 These by-laws may be amended by a majority vote of the Active members in good standing present and voting at any regular meeting of the organization after recommendation by the Board of Directors, or by any twelve active members, provided written notice of such proposed amendments shall have been given to all active voting members at least ten days prior to the meeting.

No amendments or additions to these by-laws shall be made which are not in conformity with organization Constitution.

#### ARTICLE XII - APPROVED STUDY GROUPS

Section 1 Application for Approved Status. Any three or more members in good standing may make written application to this organization for recognition as an approved study group. Such application shall be reviewed by the Study Group Advisory Committee and a report shall be make to this organization recommending disposition of the application. The application shall include an initial membership list, designated contact representative of the study group, and such other information deemed necessary for the official record.

Section 2 Name. The name of an approved study group shall be "Cambridge Collectors Study Group No". Study Groups shall also be encouraged to adopt an additional common name of their choice.

Section 3 Membership. All members of an approved study group must be members in good standing of this organization and shall have a sincere interest in the study and collecting of Cambridge glass. Study groups shall be limited to a maximum of twenty members. No additional membership requirements shall be made.

Section 4 Meetings. Approved Study Groups are encouraged to hold a minimum of eight study group meetings each year for the purpose of studying Cambridge glass or closely related subjects.

Section 5 Reports. The study group shall submit a monthly report to the Study Group Advisory Committee for the purpose of maintaining the official record of the activities of the study groups. The report shall include any changes in the membership or designated contact representative of the study group, a summary of activities and subjects discussed and other matters specified by the Study Group Advisory Committee.

Section 6 Authority. A study group shall have no authority to commit this organization on any matter.

Section 7 Termination of Approved Status. Termination of the approved status of a study group shall become effective upon acceptance, by the organization, of a recommendation of discontinuance made by the Study Group Advisory Committee. Such a recommendation shall be. (1) if requested in writing by the members of the study group. (2) for non-compliance with the rules and regulations of this organization, (3) due to inactivity for a period exceeding six months, or (4) due to conduct which violates the principles or ethics of this organization, provided that the contact representative shall have been given ten days notice in writing of such pending action together with a full statement of the reason for the recommendation, and shall have been given an opportunity for a full and fair hearing.
