

President's Message



Keep Up the Dialogue!

As Thanksgiving approaches and I write this message for our December *Crystal Ball*, the theme that keeps coming to me is the value of great communication and dialogue. Our weekend in Cambridge that included the November Quarterly Meeting of the club was populated with active and sincere dialogue about what our plans should be for the new museum and where we should be taking this club in the future.

This club has members who have been with NCC for 26 years, and it also has members who have been with us for 26 days. That sometimes makes it a challenge as I sit here at the computer and try to compose a monthly message that has strong relevancy to both groups, and all of us in-between.

This is particularly tough as I reflect on the really outstanding November Quarterly Meeting that we just had. We had a good crowd for this meeting, but it was still just under 60 members who joined us at the Holiday Inn in Cambridge. That means there were over 1,200 members who couldn't be with us.

My take-away from this meeting was that we had real openness as people were offered an opportunity, which they freely seized, to express their opinion. Ultimately, we will make decisions about how to equip and finish our new museum. Since there are so many opinions, not everyone will see the realization of their specific ideas. However, the quality of our decisions will be so enhanced because we received so many good ideas and earnest input.

Communication is so critical to the foundation of what makes a successful national organization like ours. It takes many different shapes and forms. Sometimes it is handling meaty issues like we've dealt with for over two years since our museum was destroyed by flood. Most often though, it is the dialogue between collectors about the object of their passion – glass.

This month alone, NCC had a presence at three glass shows around the country – Pennsylvania, Virginia, and Connecticut. It was a great opportunity for members to meet members, see wonderful displays of Cambridge glass, and enhance their knowledge base. This is at the heart of what a good club does ... sharing knowledge and appreciation.

I am very grateful to Shelby and Kathy Nussbaum, Larry and Kathy Thompson, Bob and Ginny Marotto, and others

in our Connecticut Cambridge Boosters for setting up an NCC display at their Southington, CT, show the first weekend in November. Normally, I have set up a display and sold NCC books at this show but I had the conflict this year of the meetings in Cambridge the same weekend. Our friends in CT stepped up and made sure we had a presence at this show, whose profits are donated to our museum. This is the third year of this association and we are very fortunate as a club to have this support!

Kudos also to John Corl and his team from our Elegant Glass Collectors study group who again set up a stand-out display at the Harrisburg Show. Their efforts show off the real beauty of Cambridge Glass by building breathtaking displays and encouraging dialogues with members, collectors, and everyday observers who come to a show and are blown away by the beauty of Cambridge.

Debuting this year was a new presence for NCC in Virginia. Our thanks to Shelley and Alex Citron for setting up a club display and sales table. These efforts are instrumental in our outreach programs. Alex and Shelley are taking this one step further by developing the first test plan for our regional membership program ... finding new ways to connect members to members and enhancing the NCC experience through dialogue and camaraderie.

We had a great first ever meeting in Cambridge of our membership task force, led by Jeff Ross. It included our study group advisory chairperson (Ken Filippini), our member services chairperson (George Stamper), Les Hansen from our Long Range Planning Committee, and Larry Everett, the president of our Miami Valley study group. We set some very ambitious goals and had a very productive dialogue about how we can increase the benefits of membership, the membership experience, and the size of our organization overall.

The thing I am so thankful for at this special time of the year is the amount and quality of the dialogue that we are having. As an organization with members in 43 states, it is a challenge to maintain a dialogue with each and every one of you. We share a passion for Cambridge Glass. Dialogue and participation as members, whether passive or active, is fundamental to why there is and should be a strong NCC. In that spirit, we wish you the most joyous of holiday seasons and Happy Collecting!

Christmas with Cambridge Circa 1906

A Cambridge advertisement published in December 1906 made mention of several lines including Sunburst and Paul Revere. Unfortunately no illustrations were provided and none of the known catalogs have any pattern/design/line captioned with either of these names. One candidate for Sunburst is the 2656 line since the 1910 Cambridge catalog had this to say about the line: "Cut Sunburst very clear, fine in shape and most desirable for the trade where a clean attractive pattern is wanted at a reasonable price."

Most people would describe the line as having a star design and in fact the line is known to Pattern Glass Collectors as Star of Bethlehem.

Produced only in clear glass, the line was discontinued before 1920 and is infrequently seen today.

Marketing 1930s Style

by Mark Nye

Following are two letters that were sent to all Cambridge agents during the summer of 1937. Apparently the sales agents were not taking advantage of promotional material available to them.

June 7, 1937

ADVERTISING SIGNS & MATERIALS

CIRCULAR LETTER #181 TO ALL AGENTS:

We find in going over various territories that our representatives do not seem to be putting forth the efforts that they should on our advertising matter.

We find very few of the Cambridge counter signs on display. This is a beautiful sign and when it is shown to buyers they all say they would like to have it.

Then there is the large Cambridge cardboard sign of the trade-mark, about which we wrote you in Circular Letters #112 and #165, but only one or two representatives are doing anything with this.

Other signs that should be prominently displayed are the following:

Glass prism sign

Black & Gold Rose Point Sign

Black & Gold Candlelight Sign

Black & Gold Caprice Sign

Black & Gold Pristine Sign

There is no excuse for the merchants not having these signs for their counters. We have given you samples and told you time and time again to add them to your orders or make a separate order and we would mail them.

We are now spending a lot of money for national advertising and these all time in nicely with it. It would appear that a good many of our representatives do not appreciate the expense and the value of this national advertising or they would have our own advertising such as we referred to above used by the stores, so it would tie in nicely with this advertising.

We trust you will check up very carefully before you go out for your fall trip and order from us such signs as you need for proper display in your sample room so that you can show the customers which you can furnish.

August 10, 1937

CUSTOMER HELPS

CIRCULAR LETTER #297 TO ALL AGENTS:

We are giving you in this letter a list of the things you should have in your display room or with you when on the road.

The first part of the list is composed of things which you can supply without charge to your customers and we want you to work these things very diligently and see that they are included on your orders and are displayed and used by your customers.

The last part of the list includes some things which are for your help only and are not to be supplied to customers.

There is one exception in the list of things which we furnish without charge. That is the Cambridge display Fixture, which is of course sold to the customer.

In the interest of space, the preceding lists have been reformatted. In the original letter, the lists were single or double column.

I don't believe I have ever seen either the large trade mark sign or the Table Architecture sign. While we did have the Caprice display fixture on display in the former museum, I am not sure what was meant by "Cambridge Display Fixture." Imprint folders were the familiar pattern folders with a place for the individual store to imprint its name and address. Apple Blossom must have remained a popular pattern since imprint folders were still being offered seven years after its 1930 introduction.



November 2000 Quarterly Meeting

An air of excitement and anticipation, and a lot of conversation about the new museum filled the room as 54 members gathered for the quarterly meeting on Saturday, November 4, at the Holiday Inn in Cambridge, Ohio. Members came from all over--Ohio, Nebraska, New Jersey, New York, Virginia, Maryland, Minnesota, and Florida. The Miami Valley study club was the most well represented with 17 members present.

As members gathered, there was an opportunity to greet old friends and share glass collecting stories. A Cambridge animals seek-and-find puzzle was circulated to challenge our skills. After a delicious meal, the meeting was called to order by president Rick Jones, and committee reports were given.

Dennis Snyder, chair of Budget and Finance, spoke of our challenging dual tasks: paying on the mortgage on the new museum, and spending money to furnish the museum at the same time.

Bud Walker, chair of the By-laws committee, led the discussion of the proposed change in the By-laws that would eliminate membership limits in study clubs, and would also eliminate a requirement for monthly reports since some study clubs do not meet monthly. During New Business, that proposed change was passed.

Cindy Arent, chair for the Museum Committee, led the discussion of plans for museum development. The three areas of attention are: Design and Display, Research Area, and Glassmaking Process Display. Twenty-five to 30 club members had gathered at the new museum on both Friday evening and Saturday morning to hear presentations from two different companies on display cases and museum layout. A lively discussion and exchange of ideas gave the committee much valuable input from members to help in their decision making. Cindy Arent encourages and welcomes comments and concerns from all members.

Tarzan Deel, chair of Nominations Committee, encourages all who are interested in running for the NCC Board of Directors to contact him.

Rick Jones, reporting for Mark Nye, chair of the Publications Committee, announced that the books on Wildflower, Elaine, Diane, and Portia would be available at Benefit Auction time.

Rick, also on behalf of Mark Nye, Convention chairperson, announced that the 2001 convention will be June 21-24. The theme will be Carnival/Mardi Gras, as a celebration of our new museum. Mark encourages members to contact him with ideas and suggestions for speakers and programs.

Webmaster, Linda Roberts, reports that our website gets approximately 85 visits a day, and that the pages getting the most hits are photo gallery, links, updates, and auction. [see page 11]

After adjournment, the Show and Tell event was led by Rich Bennett and Rick Jones. Among the beautiful items displayed were: #3400 center bowl in Forest Green with white enamel Diane etch; Royal Blue pinch decanter with gold-encrusted Gloria; #1242 Royal Blue vase with gold-encrusted Chintz; Tally Ho 8" plate with red enamel edge and blue enamel etch; Crown Tuscan bud vase with Rockwell Silver seahorse decoration; #1066 Carmen goblet with silver Lotus Hunt Scene decoration; Ebony vase with Rockwell Silver ducks and marsh decoration; Crown Tuscan dolphin candlestick with square base and Charleton decoration.

The evening's program on Cambridge animals was supposed to have been led by Lynn Welker, who had a previous commitment. In his stead, the program was very ably led by Frank Wollenhaupt. To augment the presentation, a handout on Cambridge Animals [see page 10], reprinted by Charles Upton, was passed out. It was arranged by animal type. Frank's program was arranged chronologically by date of first production. These two approaches gave the members a good cross-reference when learning about Cambridge animals. A wonderful display of Cambridge animals and animal-related items, many very rare and seldom seen, accompanied the presentation.

The next Quarterly Meeting will be in March, at the time of the Benefit Auction. We hope to see you then!


