Nearcut Era Nappy and Comport Shapes

One of the programs presented at the 2001 National Cambridge Collectors Convention dealt with the major lines of the Nearcut Era. The following article, dealing with the various nappy shapes used in the Nearcut years, is taken from that program.

Beginning with its earliest production, the Cambridge Glass Co. would use the same nappy or footed comport mould to produce a number of different shaped items. This was accomplished by hand shaping the item as soon as the piece came from the mould and the hot glass was quite pliable. In this manner a single mould could be used to make more than one piece, thus increasing the number of pieces in a line without increasing the number of moulds required. (Moulds have always been expensive to produce.)

By the time the 1906 Cambridge catalog was issued, there were 12 letter-designated nappy and/or footed comport shapes as well as a square shape that does not appear to have had a letter designator. As used in the 1906 catalog, the letters A thru E were used in conjunction with nappies and footed comports while G thru M, omitting the letter I, were used to

describe the bowl shapes of footed comports. It is possible the second group of letters was also used with nappies but catalog examples have not been found.

Re-Birthing of a Museum New Museum Update Hey Kids, What Time Is It? The letter designators A, B, and C were first used in the 1903 catalog but descriptions were not provided. The letters were not always used; many times shapes were simply described and within a given line, more than three shapes of nappies were used. In the 1903 catalog the terms round, square, flared, belled, and cupped were used to describe nappy shapes but none had letter designators.

In the 1906 Cambridge catalog, descriptions of various nappy (Continued on page 6)

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President's Message



Re-Birthing of a Museum

Over Memorial Day weekend, I had a chance to go to Cambridge and witness the progress being made on our new Museum. It is an incredibly exciting process and one that has benefited from the selfless assistance of many of our area members who help out on virtually a daily basis.

The custom built-in perimeter showcases are near completion and look gorgeous. Also, the NCC Board has just approved a plan for the same carpenter to build in the center showcases so they match the perimeter cases. Our Design and Display Committee met on Memorial Day weekend and their proposal to the Board was approved in a matter of days.

For someone who hadn't seen the building in the state it was when it was purchased, much of the progress could be seen as very subtle, almost invisible. Significant hours have gone into removing moldings, sanding, painting, and electrical. The floor had outlet boxes. These are now inset into the floor.

The three "display" rooms had some pretty old paneling on them. This has been removed and the walls resurfaced. They look great! The committee has earmarked one of these rooms to be used as a dining room setting, with a chandelier donated by the Citrons and a table from Jeff and Jill Ross.

The middle room is "The Sample Room." The old sample room door we had in the previous museum is being refinished and fitted to serve as the door for this middle room. The installation is taking place today (on June 9). The concept for this room is to replicate an old-style Cambridge display room used by their retail sales personnel. Neat idea!

The final of the three rooms is targeted as a rotating display room. The premise is to accept glass on loan from NCC collectors and display it for a limited time. Much of the beautiful glass made by Cambridge is now in collections and not seen on public display. We hope that many collectors will agree to "exhibit" their glass at the new museum. I'm sure the committee will have future announcements on their display plans and we hope we can all participate.

The first two rooms already having naming pledges from the Gallaghers and Cindy Arent/Lindy Thaxton in honor of their aunt Mary Martha Mitchell. The third room is still available for a naming pledge. The club will definitely need help to furnish and equip this room.

Sharon Miller has done a great job coordinating the Museum Capital campaign. The showcase-naming plan is almost sold-out as of this writing, but we are definitely going to need support for our research and historical areas that are up next in our phased-in plan for the Museum. Also, a naming gift remains for the "Auditorium" section. Sharon can be reached at MBHS SM@OMERESA.NET if anyone is interested in helping out. Also, our thanks to Van and Ruth Smith for donating the chairs for the auditorium, in addition to pledging two showcases.

April's "What's Your Talent?" message generated six responses: five volunteering help and one complaint. One last offer was for general assistance, and they were referred to George Stamper who coordinates our volunteer activity.

Not only is there illustrations but also a complete listing of the pieces available with each rock crystal engraving as well as the 1940 prices. This catalog pictures all the rock crystal engravings available at the time the catalog was issued. Included are a number of engravings not seen in previously reprinted catalogs as well as some that remained in the line through the early 1950s and appear in the 1949 catalog. However, many of the pieces shown in this catalog were no longer in production by 1949 and this volume gives collectors an opportunity to develop more complete listings of engravings they collect. Shown below is Moreno, one the the engravings being published for the first time. Priced at \$14.95 plus \$3.00 shipping and handling, the May 1940 Rock Crystal Catalog reprint is available for immediate shipping.



New Museum Update



The Design and Display Committee met May 26 with the following members present: Bob Gallagher, Mike Neilson, David Ray, Carl Beynon, Charles Upton, Sharon Miller, Ken Filippini, Cindy Arent, and NCC president Rick Jones as a guest. Absent members were Lynn Welker and Fred Schaefer. The purpose of the meeting was to finalize the committee recommendation on the center display area (Phase II).

The group reviewed three bids for the center showcases. After much discussion, the committee unanimously voted to recommend the custom-built showcase proposal which was submitted by the same company that built the wall units. The recommendation was sent to the NCC Board of Directors and approved on June 4.

The center case arrangement that was printed in the April *Crystal Ball* has been changed for several reasons. The committee spent many hours measuring and taping different configurations on the floor. The chosen design allows for at least 5-foot aisles and a more complimentary arrangement of the center cases.

The center case area will probably be under construction during NCC Convention week, so members will be able to view the work in progress. Thanks to all for your tremendous support!

shapes, along with letter designators, appear as part of the captions to items in the Fernland line. (The Fernland line was the first line shown in the 1906 catalog.) These 1906 shapes, as described in the catalog, are:

Nappy, A Shape or Round

Nappy, B Shape or Crimped

Nappy, C Shape or Belled

Nappy, D Shape or Flared

Nappy, E Shape or Flared & Crimped

Nappy, No letter, Square

On pages illustrating six-inch footed comports, as well as other items, additional shapes are shown, and letter designators once again used. This time, however, no descriptions are provided. Shown on these two pages are footed comports with shapes designated as F, G, H, J, K, L, and M. Apparently the letter I was not used.

The other line in the 1906 catalog known to be of Cambridge origin, Radium, also used letter designators to describe nappy shapes. The balance of the lines in the 1906 catalog, particularly those first shown in the 1903 catalog and probably not of Cambridge origin, continued to use the shape descriptions rather than letter designators.

Included in the introductory pages of the 1910 catalog was a description of nappy shapes.

"We designate the various shapes of Nappies in all lines as follows:

A shape means Plain Round Standard

C shape means Belled or Flanged

D shape means Flared Round Shallow

E shape means Flared and Crimped

F shape means Cupped or Rose Bowl

These shapes are illustrated here using a page from the 1910 catalog showing the #2693 pattern. Note that there is no longer a B shape or shapes G thru M, and the F shape is quite different than that shown on the Fernland page. A, C, D, and E shapes basically remained as described in the 1906 catalog.

When the circa 1916 catalog was issued, the word "flanged" was omitted from the C shape description. Some five years later, with the publication of Catalog #10 around 1921, the description of the F shape changed to "Cupped or Nut Bowl" with little or no change in the actual shape.







Eating is a requirement of life and we all partake in varying degrees. However, in our fast-paced society we may find that breakfast popped up from the toaster, lunch is in a package that will be "nuked" at school or the office, and the evening meal may be plopped into a waxed or Styrofoam container which we will carry-in from the carry-out! It's just the way life is! Whoa...take a deep breath, relax a bit, and return to the more leisurely days of the late '20s and early 30s.



We will be serving breakfast, lunch and dinner.....glassware provided by the Cambridge Glass Company. (Get your catalog reprints and look for these glass items)

Breakfast for one? The menu is:

Half a grapefruit Soft-boiled egg with toast Coffee or tea

This meal will be served using the Cambridge eight-piece breakfast set consisting of a tray, cup and saucer, cereal or grapefruit bowl, bread and butter plate, egg cup, and an individual cream and sugar.....not so bad being alone!

Breakfast with friends? There will be a buffet for four. The menu will be:

Fresh squeezed orange juice Waffles was Bacon and scrambled eggs Coffe

Waffles with powdered sugar and syrup Coffee or tea

Using the #3075 22 oz. covered pitcher and matching 5 oz. footed tumblers, the chilled orange juice is ready to be poured. We will be using the Cambridge waffle set in the Decagon line: cups and saucers, #867 cream and sugar, #803 batter jug with under plate, a 10 ½" serving plate, 8 ½" plates, #813 sugar sifter, and #802 syrup jug with under plate. Lift the lid on the #950 13" bacon and egg and help yourself. What color have you imagined for this buffet setting? Did you select an etch?

It is a beautiful day so lunch will be served on the veranda. The menu will be:

Crab Louis with Avocado slices Hot Rolls and Butter Lemonade
Angel Cake with Fresh berries and whipped cream

Our Cambridge glass will come from the 3400 Line, Gold Krystol etched Apple Blossom. Each place setting will consist of the #1174 bread and butter and #1176 salad plate and a 9 oz. lunch goblet. The dessert will be served in the 6 oz. footed sherbet on #1181 6" plate. Additional pieces needed will be the 50 oz. footed jug and the 5 ½" butter with cover. The breeze is gentle. I hope you are content!

Breakfast and lunch were pretty much on the casual side. Dinner is not! Dinner will be a formal occasion. Two major lines, 3400 and Decagon from the 1930s offered plates in many sizes, serving pieces and stemware to challenge your imagination and meet all your needs for the perfect dining table. The 3500 line, Gadroon also offered many interesting pieces but did not seem to include dinner plates. How about using the Round Line dinner plates! With all this Cambridge glass available, it should not be a question of what to eat, but rather what to eat off of.

You know, I have had a busy day what with planning breakfast and lunch. Dinner for eight is up to you, hors d'oeuvres and all. And don't forget the centerpiece for the table, and the candleholders. While you are planning all this (are you using Rose Point?), I will close my eyes, drift into a light slumber and perhaps see Howdy Doody in my dreams!

Announcing

The Cambridge Glass Co. The Non-Cataloged Etchings



This long awaited book presents the etchings, found on Cambridge etching plates, that were not illustrated or listed in any of the known Cambridge catalogs, price lists or advertised in trade journals. Thus they are being referred to as the "non-cataloged etchings." This does not imply the etchings shown in this book were never put into commercial production. An unknown number probably were, perhaps for only a short time, and not long enough to appear in a catalog. Many were sample etchings, only put on a few pieces of a single item and never sold commercially.

Some of the etchings in this book are familiar to Cambridge collectors as pieces appear from time to time, indicating they were probably commercially produced. Another group of the etchings included in the book are familiar to the serious Cambridge student since at least one or two examples have been found and in many instances, displayed in the original NCC Museum or in the Bennett Museum. Many are being seen for the first time and altogether, over 230 etchings are illustrated.

Published by National Cambridge Collectors, Inc. and edited by Mark Nye, "The Cambridge Glass Co. The Non-Cataloged Etchings" will go on sale at the NCC Convention later this month and be available for mail orders after July 1. The book is priced at \$12.95. If ordered by mail, the usual shipping and handling charges will apply.

NIGCS Announces Museum Building Acquisition

Paul Douglas, President of the National Imperial Glass Collectors Society, today announced the purchase of a building at 3210 Belmont Street in Bellaire, Ohio for the purpose of establishing the National Imperial Glass Museum. The building was formerly owned by the Belmont Community Hospital.

As Mr. Douglas observed, "This represents a giant step forward in the culmination of a search that has taken many years and has involved the efforts of many individuals without whose dedication this would never have been possible. The unwavering support and encouragement of the City of Bellaire has always helped us to know that, one day, we would be able to take this step."

The opening of a museum has been the major goal of the NIGCS which, this year, marks its 25th anniversary. The National Imperial Glass Museum will feature displays of Imperial Glassware as well as other Bellaire glassware from the Ohio Valley Glass and Artifacts Museum and will be dedicated to the glassware and people who worked at Imperial. Thus, the story of Imperial, the largest and most diverse of the companies that made up the American hand-made glass industry, will not be forgotten.

An opening date of June 2002, coinciding with the NIGCS' Annual Convention, has been targeted for the opening of the Museum's first phase following a period of design and renovation.
