# Cambridge Experimental Cased Glass

During the reopened period, March 1955–1958. The Cambridge Glass Company experimented with the idea of producing items of cased glass. The dictionary definition of cased glass is. Blown glass consisting of two or more fused layers of different colors of glass. The combined colors are taken from the mould and reheated so the two layers of glass fuse together."

We received a piece of Cambridge experimental cased glass as a gift from Cindy's aunt. Mary Martha Mitchell. When she gave us this gift, she also wrote this short description describing the circumstances under which the glass was produced. Following is the text of that letter:

"When The Cambridge Glass Company resumed operations after having been closed from August 1954 until March1, 1955, all of the previous customers were dissatisfied. Naturally, the customers were angry because they could not fill in their lines."

Tom Walshe, a former Cambridge Glass Company salesman in the Southeast, became Sales Manager for the re-opened company. His thinking was that if we could manufacture some unusual items, we might be able to lure some of our customers back.

One of his ideas was to try to case glass which wasn't being done in the United States—It is a very difficult process and our workers were not able to master it—This vase was one of those pieces.

Her written note does not describe what it was that the Cambridge workers could not master, but she said it was the thickness of the glass layers that was the problem. She had in her collection several pieces of what she called "French" cased glass. These pieces have an inner layer of white glass 1/32 of an inch thick covered with an outer layer of colored glass 3/16 inches thick. In contrast, if you examine a piece of the Cambridge cased glass, the layers vary in thickness from piece to piece and are all

### Glass Show Outreach Works!

Gettin' on the road.

There are times we, as a club, seem very Cambridge-centric, but that's not an accurate picture. We have a truly national organization with many involved members who help spread our knowledge across this great country.

This past weekend (8/10/11) we were once again at the Great Northeast Glass Show in White Plains, NY. This year marked the eighth consecutive year that NCC had a free booth at the show and set up a glass display and sold Cambridge books.

Our partnership with Joe Solito and the White Plains Show began a new era where we recommitted as a club to building a presence at glass shows all over the country. This "outreach" effort is fundamental to our education and preservation mission. We know that not everyone can make a Convention or visit our Museum, so the club has to come to you!

We'll have strong representation at no fewer than a half dozen glass shows in the country this year. New to our roster this month (September) will be San Antonio, Texas, thanks to an invitation from Kent Washburn, who promotes this big show. Texas NCC members Jeannie and Freeman Moore agreed to quarterback our display and sales table. Hopefully other Texas and Southwestern members will be there to help them out and spread the word.

These shows serve many purposes. They allow us to display glass (usually in themed exhibits) to help educate the attendees at the show about Cambridge. They allow us to sell books, which both spreads education and generates income for the club. We also get to meet many new people, spread the fellowship and recruit new members.

For me, whenever I can make a regional show like I was able to do in Colorado and Oregon in recent years, I have been able to meet wonderful NCC members who heretofore have only been names on a piece of paper. This "connection" is fundamental to being part of a preservation organization. It has really been a pleasure to meet many of you personally and hear your nice comments about the direction of the club. We want to do even better.

One of our best associations has been a group called the Connecticut Cambridge Boosters. They are The Marottos, Fehers, Kilborns, Nussbaums, Thompsons (and probably more I am unintentionally leaving out). Four years ago, they shifted the benefactor of their Fall Glass Show to National Cambridge Collectors, Inc. All profits from the show go to the club.

To date, the "Boosters" have raised over \$5,000 for us, all of which has been directed to the Museum. The first year, they supported Flood Recovery. In Year II, it was the Building Fund – helping us acquire our Ninth Street facility. In Year III, it was

Since the Grand Opening celebration in June, there continues to be much activity at the Museum. The Museum collection now has several new acquisitions thanks to the generous contributions by members at Convention. The new items have been added to the Museum inventory list, have been numbered, and are now part of the display. Also at Convention, member Bill Courter presented two copies of the Henry Hellmers Batch Book to NCC. The information in this volume has already been used to answer questions from visitors about various Cambridge colors.




CAMBRIDGE EXPERIMENTAL—Committed from page 15 much thicker. The Cambridge pieces shown in the pictures have inner layers from 1/16 to 3/16 inches thick and outer layers from 1/8 to 1/4 inches thick.

All of the pieces which are shown in the pictures were once part of Aunt Mary Martha's collection. Four of the pieces consist of an inner layer of Milk Glass covered with an outer layer of Tahoe Blue The one other vase is Milk Glass covered with an outer layer of crystal.


In addition to being cased glass, the vases also have a "controlled bubble" effect which appears to be between the two layers of glass. Although the bubbles do not show up well in the pictures, they cover the vases and are evenly spaced similar to the controlled bubbles found in Cambridge paper weights. The bubbles on the rose bowl are round, while on the taller vases they have been elongated as the neck of the vase was stretched. The napkin rings do not have bubbles.

Although it is fairly certain that none of these pieces were ever production items, there are several other pieces known to exist. Examples of the Milk/ Tahoe and Milk/Crystal vases can be seen at the NCC museum.

# National Cambridge Collectors Inc. Annual Meeting

June 28, 2002

President Rick Jones called the Annual Meeting for the National Cambridge Collectors Inc. to order at 8:30 p.m. on June 28, 2002, at the Pritchard Laughlin Civic Center. Rick started the meeting by asking everyone present to give a special acknowledgement to the eight club members who ran for the NCC Board. He said that it was a testament to the growth of NCC that eight such qualified people were willing to serve the club in this capacity and that because of this group's vast array of qualifications and remarkable level of talent, NCC could expect to put everyone of the candidates to work. Rick thanked outgoing Board member Mike Neilson for his years of service to NCC. Rick read a letter of congratulations to NCC upon the opening of the National Museum of Cambridge Glass from Paul Douglas, president of the National Imperial Glass Collectors Society. The letter thanked the NCC Museum Committee and Cindy Arent, in particular, for all the help Imperial has received in their effort to open the new Imperial Glass Museum.

Rick thanked Marcy and Dale Allenbaugh for a \$10,000 donation to the NCC Museum to be used for what will be called the Allenbaugh Auditorium. Rick reported on plans for reorganization of the committee structures, the goal being to get more people involved, to freshen up a variety of positions, and to set up more measurable goals leading to a stronger foundation for the future success of NCC. The first major announcement being that Larry Everett will be taking over Membership from Jeff Ross, who Rick thanked for his many years of service to NCC. Rick announced that at the March Board Meeting a vote was taken to elect Charles Upton lifetime membership status, to thank Charles for his many years of service and enormous efforts on behalf of NCC.

A motion was made by Mark Nye and seconded by Georgia Otten to dispense with the reading of the March 1, 2002, Quarterly Meeting minutes. The motion carried and the minutes were approved as published in the *Crystal Ball*.

Treasurer's Report – Charles Upton reported the club funds status as of May 31, 2002, were: Operating Fund - \$27,811; Building Fund - \$75,981; Endowment Fund - \$22,451; for a total worth of \$126,243.

#### Committee Reports

Acquisitions – In Lynn Welker's absence, Rick reported that NCC had acquired little new glass, but that Budget/Finance would be working on a plan to set up a sensible budget for future acquisitions.

Budget/Finance – Dennis Snyder reported that copies of financial statements for December 31, 2000/2001, plus statements comparing the first five months of 2002/2001 were available at the Annual Meeting. Dennis invited anyone who was interested to pick them up at the front table. Dennis gave a special thanks to Charles Upton for his invaluable help, and spoke of the smooth transition of Charles's bookkeeping

duties which will be taken over by Lisa Neilson Dennis reported that after six years as Budget/Finance chairman, he would be handing over the reins to Mike Strebler, who will take NCC to the next plateau. Dennis reported that the Museum has cost NCC \$50,000 in excess of the \$113,000 in capital donations received. Dennis said that NCC has purchased the final portion of the Museum parking lot for \$5,000 Dennis reported that the original Museum mortgage of \$125,000, as of June 30, 2002, was now down to \$80,000. He said that with no further capital reduction, at the current pay-down rate, it would take only five years to pay off the existing balance.

By-Laws -- Bud Walker -- no report

Corresponding Secretary - Charles Upton - no report

Endowments – George Stamper wanted to assure the membership that Endowment Funds were being diligently watched over, and that the investments have made interest over the principal. George reported that there were grant opportunities for matching funds that could greatly increase the Endowment Fund, and suggested he let Sharon Miller fill in the details during her grants report.

Facilities – Carl Beynon said that he was sure everyone present had seen his report, meaning the new Museum, so there was not much for him to say.

Grants - Sharon Miller thanked the Huffords and Wollenhaupts for the superb running of the Silent Auction. Sharon reported that the newly formed Century Club had to date raised \$21,000, and that this money was earmarked for a pending grant to be applied to the Endowment Fund The proposed grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities, is a matching grant called a Challenge Grant. Sharon explained that the grant called "Our Glass Heritage. See It, Feel It, Become Part of It" is a one-to-one match. If NCC can raise \$50,000 by December 2002, and the grant is received, a match of \$50,000 will be gotten. It is a three-year program and if the maximum is reached, a \$300,000 net could be added to the Endowment Fund. The approval date for the grant is December 2002. Sharon made a plea to those who have not yet contributed their \$100 for the Century Club to please make this commitment, as it will go a long way to ensure the lasting existence of the NCC Museum.

Long Range Planning – Mike Strebler discussed the strategic plan called Dawn, that his committee created. It is a theoretical account of what the club does. Mike reported that a second plan called Today, that is now being written, would be used to put Dawn into action. This plan will draw on the abundant human resources available at this time to NCC.

**Membership** – Jeff Ross reported membership as: Master Members – 877; Associate Members – 357; Honorary – 7; Lifetime – 4; Total – 1245.

Museum – Cindy Arent gave her sincere thanks to all those who lent their support to the monumental efforts that have made the Museum the success it is. Cindy reported that a Self-Guided Tour for the Museum has been created, and will be updated as necessary.

Publicity – Cindy Arent reported that NCC was featured with a six-page spread in the May issue of *Ohio Magazine*. The article reported on Cambridge glass, NCC, the new Museum, and listed the club's website. Cindy, Mike Neilson, and Sharon Miller acquired 33 local sponsors to produce a commemorative insert to advertise the Grand Opening in *The Daily Jeffersonian*, the Cambridge newspaper.

Non Glass - Bill Hagerty - not present

**Projects** – Rick Jones reported for Bill Hagerty that the newest NCC fundraiser was a reproduction of a Caprice goblet in Jadite, and that they were available for sale at this time.

Publications – Mark Nye reported that the new *Decorates* book was now for sale. Mark said that a new book on Rock Crystal cuttings was in the works and for a long-range project, a book on the history of Cambridge glass was also planned

Study Groups - Ken Filippini reported that it has been a big year for the study groups and began by thanking Ken and Judy Rhoads for successfully getting their mentoring program for the first-time conventioneers off to such a great start. Ken thanked the Miami Valley Study Group especially Frank Wollenhaupt, Larry Everett, and Georgia Otten, for this year's Convention program on Cambridge candlesticks; Miami Valley representatives Bev and George Stamper, for spearheading the book sales table at this year's Convention; and the Huffords and the Wollenhaupts, for running this year's newly created Silent Auction. Ken said that the Grand Opening Party for the NCC Museum was a total joint study group effort, and in particular thanked: Lisa Neilson, for the work she did on the invitation process; Barbara Wyrick, for arranging the fabulous display of food that was served at the party; Shelley Citron, for designing, creating, and donating the programs for the event; the Joneses and the Streblers, for donating the wine; Tarzan Deel, for a laundry list of donated items and timely suggestions that were invaluable; and the study groups, as a whole, for their donation of \$1,150.

Ken said that a special thanks was necessary for the donation of \$1,200 from the Connecticut Boosters, a group who has monetarily supported the NCC Museum from inception to completion. Ken thanked the Duftts, Duchamps, Weekses, Moores, Streblers, Arents, Sharon Miller, and especially Carl Beynon, for all their efforts which made the party the success it was. Ken continued by thanking his wife Jane, saying that she was the glue that pulled the whole effort together. Ken then thanked Rick Jones, for his vision, guidance, drive, and unceasing efforts on behalf of the Museum and NCC in general.

Ken called on representatives of each study group: Miami Valley – Larry Everett; Cambridge Cordials – Judy Momirov; Wildflowers – Barbara Wyrick; Virginia – Alex Citron; North Texas – Freeman Moore; Elegant Glass Collectors – Ken Filippini; who all gave an update of what the study groups have been doing, and what plans they have for the future.

Technology and the Web – Linda Roberts reported that the NCC website was very active, receiving around 5,400 hits a month, and that many visitors were from countries all around the world, giving NCC a global presence. Linda reminded the membership that the Quarterly Board Meeting minutes were available in the member only section of the site. Linda said she had need for volunteers to help answer the many glass questions she received, and hoped that if anyone had expertise they would be willing to act in this capacity. Linda requested photos for the website stating that this was one of the most visited areas.

Convention - Mark Nye reported that we were having it.

**Auction** – Rick Jones reported for Squeek Rieker that the auction would take place the first weekend in March 2003, and that those interested in consigning glass should start the process now. Rick said that last year's auction sales were in the neighborhood of \$36,000 with net proceeds for NCC around \$6,000 to \$7,000.

**Glass Show** – Joy McFadden reported that it was happening, and running smoothly.

Glass Dash – Larry Everett announced that the Dash would take place tomorrow morning at the Beach Grove Development Center: Early Bird 7:00 a.m. – 8:30 a.m. – \$10 admission; General admission after 8:30 a.m. – \$2.

Crystal Ball – Lorraine Weinman thanked everyone who submitted articles to the paper this year, and invited the membership to please continue contributing.

Member Services – George Stamper said "Ask not what NCC could do for you, but rather what can you do for NCC."

Old Business - None

New Business – Frank Wollenhaupt suggested that a by-laws change might be in order, in reference to how selection should be done to replace a Board opening when a Board member is unable to fulfill his/her term. Frank thought the fairest system would be to select the fourth highest vote-getter from the previous election slate. Doug Ingraham asked what the existing rule for a Board vacancy was at this time. Rick Jones said that the by-laws currently read that the club president appoints a replacement for the unfinished duration of that term. The president's selection needs to be ratified with a 2/3 vote by the Board of Directors. After further discussion the matter was referred to the By-Laws committee for additional study, and their recommendation will be brought before the Board at the August meeting.

Rick Jones opened the floor to the question: How did people feel about the changes that were introduced at this year's convention. Dennis Snyder suggested that the timeframe for the Friday night dinner might need to be looked at, as the Annual Meeting which followed, he felt, started too late. He also recommended that the Silent Auction might better be served if it was not run during the meeting. Rick responded (Continued on page 16)
