### The 2016 Annual Convention

Each year as annual convention approaches, I cannot help but reflect on my earliest memories of attending the Cambridge Glass Show and the many people who influenced my passion for collecting Cambridge glass. Do you remember your first Cambridge Glass Show? I attended my first Cambridge Glass Show in 1989. The glass show was held at the Shenandoah Truck Stop in Old Washington, OH which is located about 15 minutes east of Cambridge. My memories of the 1989 and

1990 Cambridge Glass Shows are difficult to separate, but my lasting memory of attending the shows is the same. Being a very new collector of crystal Caprice, I was truly overwhelmed with all the different pieces of Caprice available for purchase. Dealers offered Caprice collectors what seemed to be an endless supply of quality Caprice items. In 1991, the Cambridge Glass Show moved to the newly constructed Pritchard Laughlin Civic Center. With a combination of the larger showroom, improved lighting, and the increased number of glass dealers, the PLCC provided a spectacular setting to host the Cambridge Glass Show. The 2016 glass showroom will be filled to nearly 100% capacity. Several new glass dealers from around the country are bringing their finest pieces of elegant glassware for this year's show.

As a novice collector in the early 1990's and throughout my 27 years of collecting Cambridge glass, my passion for collecting was influenced by many current and former NCC members. ### 2017 NCC AUCTION CONSIGNMENT PROCEDURES

### "ATTENTION CONSIGNORS"

**Some changes to the 2017 NCC Benefit Auction Procedures.** The auction will be held on Saturday, March 4<sup>th</sup>, 2017. The Fall Membership Meeting has been moved to Saturday October 15<sup>th</sup>, 2016. This will result in changing some due dates for Consignors submitting their lists and mailing or bringing the accepted items to the Fall meeting.

Consignors must submit their list to the Auction committee by Wednesday August 31, 2016. If at all possible, please try to follow this format to make our job a little easier. Submit your list in Excel ® or Word document (preferably Excel). An example of how you

should describe an item is provided here:

2. The Auction Committee will make final selections and notify consignors by Tuesday September 20, 2016. We select approximately 400 pieces of glass. If you question why

certain pieces are not chosen, it does not mean that they are undesirable; and we encourage you to submit them again another year. It can mean different things: we already have chosen a similar piece from another consignor, or we can only accept a certain number of pieces from each consignor to be fair to all.

3. Consignors will either mail or bring their glass to the Fall Membership Meeting on Saturday October 15, 2016. Those who will not be attending the meeting will have approximately 3 weeks to mail their items. Please DO NOT MAIL Lists or Glass TO THE MUSEUM. The address for shipping your glass will be included in your Acceptance Letter.

For those consignors able to bring their glass with them while attending the Fall Membership Meeting, you save on shipping charges, avoid potential breakage in transit, and, best of all, you get to attend a great NCC function including an excellent dinner and program accompany the meeting. In the event that we accept an item based on the consignment list, and it is determined <u>not</u> to be Cambridge glass, we will hold it for pickup by the consignor or have it mailed once they send us the return shipping charge.

- 4. A few pointers on the glass you are submitting.
  - Please, CLEAN glass only it sells so much better when it is CLEAN. If we have to clean your glass, the chances of the item getting damaged is greater and we will not be responsible if it is damaged.
  - Make sure prior sales stickers or glue from stickers is removed. There are great products on the market to remove the stickers.

This is a benefit auction for your favorite club, and we want to realize as much profit as possible. On all consignments, NCC retains 20% of the purchase price,

the consignor receives 80%. This auction does not allow for reserves or minimum prices. There are no buyer's premiums charged. Let's help make the 2017 NCC Benefit Auction successful.

Donations are welcomed and ENCOURAGED as well, and 100% of the purchase price goes to NCC. Some lower-value donated pieces may be sold in the museum's gift shop rather than be included in the auction, if the committee feels that will yield a better price.

The committee needs to strictly adhere to all dates mentioned as we only have a few short weeks to properly inspect, identify and have a completed auction catalog sent to the Crystal Ball editor, so that it can be included in the January issue and posted on the NCC web site. We would like to thank all consignors in advance for their timeliness in each step of the procedures.

We encourage you to consider consigning and donating good quality pieces of Cambridge glass. 

### Proposed changes to the NCC By-Laws



### Statuesque (Nude Stem) Line

A Seashell #11 7" comport with Shell top in solid Mandarin Gold with original label on the foot sold for \$176. A set of six cocktails in "late" colors



A pair of brandies with Carmen bowls brought \$133. The color in one was noticeably darker than the other. A

pair of champagnes with Carmen bowls sold for \$181, while one with an Amber bowl was offered at \$195 and sold at an undisclosed Best Offer price.





A table goblet with Forest Green bowl sold for \$195, while one with a Carmen bowl sold at \$121. A banquet goblet with Carmen bowl sold for \$799. This is the only 3011 goblet using a 6" nude stem.

### Animals and Figural items

This month's figural item highlight was a two-bun Geisha flower frog, the kind



with the screw-on base, in dark amber. A decisive buyer clicked Buy It Now and acquired this choice item for \$850.

A crystal Buddha figure mounted as a lamp sat tight and sold for the opening bid of \$195.

A 10-1/2 inch swan in Ebony swam away for \$350. A#40 10 inch Flower or Fruit Center (aka the "Flying Nude" footed bowl) with a pair of Statuesque candleholders in

A #3400/100 76 ounce ice lipped jug etched Diane sold for \$69. A #3400/92 32 oz. ball decanter in Amethyst with gold encrusted Apple Blossom sold for \$395 on a Buy It Now. A #615 cigarette box



and cover etched Elaine brought \$135 on a Buy It Now.

### **Rose Point**

This month was again heavy with listings for Rose Point etched items. Here are the highlights:

A lid for the #P300 candy dish, the one with the applied rose-shaped finial, sold at the opening bid of \$125.

A blown lid that

looks like it would fit either the #1066 candy box or #3121 blown candy box sold for \$60 on Buy It Now.



Interestingly, there are several other lone lids etched Rose Point being offered on eBay right now, so if you're missing a Rose Point lid of some kind, you might want to take a look.

A#157 marmalade with sterling lid sold for \$35 on a Buy It Now. If you didn't know, you might think that a pair of #400/56 5-1/4 inch fruit saucers (small bowls) would go over with a yawn, but they didn't. They sold for the opening bid of \$159. A scarce #1320 14 ounce decanter and stopper sold for \$153.




A comport with Wallace Rose Point sterling around the foot and the bowl, and Rose Point etching on the glass, too, was a sterling find at \$161.

A #3400/97 ball-shaped perfume with fancy keyhole style long dauber sold for \$295 on a Buy It Now.



### Miscellaneous



A #30 shallow belled bowl with honeycomb optic sold for \$30 on a Buy It Now. It didn't occur to the seller to provide measurements in the auction description, however this bowl only came in a 10" size.

A Cambridge arms set consisting of the 3-way arm set in a Farber Brothers chrome base and holding three Amethyst nappies, also set in Farber chrome, sold for \$86. While not rare, I have to say that I don't see that many of these sets "out in the wild" anymore.

I get excited about some of the oddest things. One of the neat-o things I spied this month was a Decagon 15" oval bowl etched Cleo. Apparently another Cambridge

glass collector who is as much of a geek as me liked it as much as I did, and pulled the Buy It Now trigger for \$185.



A #1066 footed ashtray with Royal Blue top sold for a rather surprising \$118.

Speaking of ashtrays, a #1311 4" footed ash tray with Heatherbloom top etched Diane brought \$171.

A pair of Everglades / Leaf Line double candleholders in satinized crystal sold for a groan-inducing \$30 in an "incognito" listing.

One Caprice #1138 triple candleholder (the early style with crosshatching on the balls below the candle sockets) in Carmen sold for \$120. See Jack Thompson's

article in the September 2014 Crystal Ball explaining the 1338 candlestick.

A #3400/71 4-footed nut dish etched Wildflower sold for \$35 on a Buy It Now – and my friend who



collects footed nut dishes and salt cellars thanked me for forwarding the auction to him.

A#3400/144 cigarette holder with ashtray foot and place card holder with an Amethyst top sold for \$25. The same seller had another one with a Forest Green top, which went a little higher, at \$34.



A#1321 28 ounce decanter and stopper etched Hunt scene sold for \$90, clean but with one tiny nick to the rim.

A set of six #1402/200 Tally Ho blown tall sherbets (they are champagnes, if you ask me) with <u>Carmen bowls and</u>

silk screen decoration (lace), with some wear to the gold, sold for \$195 in an incognito listing.

Finally, a pair of #1442 double candleabra with the "lyre" type center, complete with bobeches, sold for \$500.

Several readers sent me information gleaned from the Miami Valley Ohio chapter's website, which revealed that the Rose Point hurricane chimneys I reported on in last month's column were made from the mold for the #78 vase. The chimney carries the same line number. Thank you to Grant Geisler and Larry Everett.

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


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

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
