PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

50 Years 1973 - 2023

March 2023 represents the 50th anniversary of National Cambridge Collectors, Inc. For the benefit of our newer members, I would like to reprint the first President's Message from 1973 to provide some background about our organization.

It is with the greatest pleasure that I present the "CRYSTAL BALL" to you for your reading pleasure and I extend a warm welcome to each and every member of the greatest organization in the world, The NATIONAL CAMBRIDGE COLLECTORS, Inc.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank every member of the Board of Directors for their tireless efforts in helping in every way to see that the NATIONAL CAMBRIDGE COLLECTORS, Inc. became a reality, and lam sure that it will continue to grow and become worthy of the

representation of the Company and glassware that it represents.

On March 5, 1973, the first organizational meeting of the Board of Directors was held in the Community Room of the Cambridge Savings and Loan Co. in Cambridge, Ohio. The purpose of this meeting was to present the intent and purpose of the proposed organization to the persons who were chosen to serve on the original Board of Directors, and to confirm the list of names chosen. The persons chosen were picked for their individual abilities which were considered to be important for the success of the organization. Everyone could not be chosen to serve, so please do not feel left out, by any means. We will need the help and efforts of many people to assure the future of the organization.

The organization was formed at the first meeting and

officers were elected and various committees appointed. The Board elected me to serve as the President; Ruth Forsythe of Plain City, Ohio as Vice-President; Richard Pavlov of Cambridge as Secretary; John Wolfe of Cambridge as Treasurer. The Constitution and By-Laws were read and discussed and were adopted at the next meeting of the Board, which was held April 3, 1973.

Members of the Board of Directors were asked to bring an item of Cambridge Glass to the meeting, that they considered to be rare, and we viewed some real "goodies". I will not elaborate on each item, but there were a couple of real desirable pieces that I would like to own. If we can organize an exhibit which everyone can display their goodies, for 1974, I am sure that

a visit to Cambridge next year will be a must for anyone interested in Cambridge Glass. You will see pieces that you never knew existed.

The ultimate goal of this organization is to establish a permanent museum, here in Cambridge, Ohio for the preservation and study of Cambridge Glass. Everyone can come and study the many colors,

shapes, cutting, etchings and decorations that were used on Cambridge Glass. We are all looking forward to this goal and realize that is in the distant future and that it can only become a reality through the tireless efforts of the members of this organization.

We encourage the formation of local study clubs which will met more regularly for the study of Cambridge Glass and we will furnish names of National members in your area to help you get organized. We will help with anything you wish if it is possible.

A convention is being planned for the May, 1974 meeting, and I am sure that it will be one to remember for years to come. The people that have been appointed to this task are very capable and have the knowledge to construct such a convention. You should, therefor, try to plan your vacations so that you will be here for the show and convention.

This publication will contain such information that is of interest to collectors of Cambridge Glass and will accept advertisements for publication. Any advertisement that contains reproductions will not knowingly be accepted for publication unless they are very clearly stated as such. Please let us know of things that you would like to see in the publication in the future and we will try our best to satisfy your reading desires. Let us know of any good finds of rare Cambridge Glass so you can share your joy with everyone else. Send your letters to Richard Pavlov, 623 Wheeling Ave, Cambridge, Ohio 43725 and please send your SASE for return replies, so we can keep down expenses. Dick volunteered for the job of publishing our monthly letter and he has experience in this field and a great big THANK YOU for Dick Pavlov. A big job with little thanks.

There is a beautiful museum being built here in Cambridge, to house the personal collection of Harold and Judy Bennett. It is to be open for the Sixth Annual Cambridge Antique Showsale which will be held at the National Guard Armory on the 5th. and 6th. of May. I am sure that you will be well pleased for the visit to Cambridge this year. In closing, I would like to thank Ruth Forsythe, Evelyn Allen, Bob Coyle, and Loren Yeakley for the abundance of advice and counseling that they gave John Wolfe and myself in building this organization to this point. They are the persons that really fed the fuel to make the gears turn. John and I thank each of you.

We hope that you will find enjoyment and education from being a member of the NATIONAL CAMBRIDGE COLLECTORS, Inc. and that you will encourage others to become members. What's New at the Museum for 2023?

Since the Museum closed for the season on December 17th, much planning, cleaning and developing of new exhibits has been achieved. The biggest task of all is the cleaning of the glass and showcases.

One new display is: World War II Scrap Iron Drive. Between 1938 and 1946, The Cambridge Glass Company scrapped hundreds of its molds to assist in the war effort. The pieces on display are a small representation of the items manufactured from the iron molds that were donated. During World War II, scrap drives were a popular way for everyone to contribute to the war effort. By recycling unused or unwanted metal, the government could build ships, airplanes and other equipment needed to fight the war.

Another new exhibit is: *The Cambridge Glass Company Restaurant*, located in the Museum Education Center. We hope to have audio with the exhibit before we open for the season and are looking for the following pieces in crystal:

- 3300 Moderne Covered Sugar
- 3300 Moderne 6 oz. Oil Bottle/1 Handle/ Stopper
- 3300 Moderne 12 oz. Footed Soda



NCC, like most other non-profit organizations, relies on the generosity of its membership for support. Each of us makes choices when we prioritize our charitable giving, whether it is your church, alma mater, or other organizations you feel passionate about. NCC is very fortunate to have been included in charitable giving plans during the past year. NCC is an IRS recognized 501(c) (3) non-profit organization and your donations may be tax deductible.

NCC exists through member giving. We use an Annual Fund system to raise funds and keep track of the gifts we receive. All unrestricted gifts to NCC are included in the Annual Fund using calendar year cash counting. If there is more than one gift in a year, the gifts are aggregated when recognizing the member. The Annual Fund is also a nice way to remember former Friends by making tribute gifts in their honor, such as the gifts received this past year in memory of: Dorothy Kell, Jim Finley, Steve Klemko, Mac and Georgia Otten, Virginia Houston, and Don Spencer. NCC also receives gifts for specific purposes that can only be used for the purpose indicated. These restricted gifts are recognized separately and not included in the Annual Fund.

The Annual Fund uses a common "renewal" date. NCC sends out Annual Fund materials to everyone once a year. There are no monthly reminders or renewal dates. The mailing takes place in early April and includes the balloting process for board elections. In 2022, we also did follow-up mailings in July, September and October. There are new Friends each year, and some that we don't hear from, but the majority of the supporters of the

Annual Fund are there year-in and year-out. We have a challenge to increase our membership numbers with new Friends. We need your help to continue to promote the benefits of NCC and to grow our membership.

The Annual Fund enables us to operate the museum, publish the Crystal Ball, and carry out our mission activities of education and preservation. Most other activities are self-supporting such as convention, auction, and quarterly meetings. We also want to grow the Endowment Fund to sustain the organization into the future.

The Annual Fund recognizes member philanthropy using gift recognition levels. The number of households participating at the Patron level (\$35) is 215. The Benefactor levels (214) are amazingly consistent with almost all of last year's benefactor contributors renewing this year. Every year's Annual Fund has been a great tribute to the Friends of Cambridge in their support of Cambridge Glass and its history. A tabulation of all results for the year is included below. With all the challenges that year 2022 presented, NCC thanks you for your contribution.

NCC is a collective of glass friends who enjoy and appreciate the artistry of the variety of glass products produced by the Cambridge Glass Company. We, collectively, are the only group of individuals dedicated to Cambridge Glass. As such, we are proud to recognize all *Friends of Cambridge* who contributed at the Benefactor level as of December 31, 2022.



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

Zoom & Tell: Figural Flower Frogs

One of the most attributed pieces of glassware to the Cambridge Glass Company is the figure flower holder (aka flower frog). Most collectors immediately think of the Draped Lady, but Cambridge produced many figure flower holders during the 1920-1930's and continued with limited production through the factory's closing in 1958. The January Zoom & Tell program was led by Jack Thompson. Having championed the effort to create a color chart for the figure flower holders which was printed in the September 2022 issue of the Crystal Ball, Jack provided Zoom participants a thorough history of the production of the many figure flower holders while providing photo examples for guests to see.

The first figure flower holder was created by adding the head, feet and tail of a turtle to a traditional round flower block. The turtle flower block was introduced around 1916 and continued to be produced into the

1940's. Although the mold was in production for many years, the turtle flower block is quite difficult to find, especially in color (Ebony, Early Dark Emerald and Crown Tuscan).



About 10 years later, Cambridge launched its production of the more typical figure flower holder and production was robust through the mid-1930's. Two of the most mysterious figure flower holders are the Melon Boy and Bird on Stump. Collectors strongly believe these figure flower holders were produced by Cambridge, but no documentation has ever been discovered to confirm this theory. Why has the Bird on Stump only been found







in Light Emerald? Why did production end so quickly for these two figure flower holders when Cambridge

was just starting its figure flower holder line? Most collectors believe the production of the Melon Boy ceased and the Bird on Stump mold was modified to become the Eagle figure flower holder shortly after their introduction. Apparently, these changes happened so quickly that neither figure was documented in a catalog or trade journal publication. These questions may never be answered, but if anyone has additional information about these two figure flower holders, please let us know.

In total, 25 different molds were used to produce the various figure flower holders at the Cambridge Glass Company. Mold modifications occurred over the years for the large Draped Lady, short Draped Lady, Rose Lady, tall Bashful Charlotte, short Bashful Charlotte and large Heron to help eliminate cracking and to hide mold flaws in the base. Many of these figure flower holders were produced in the colors from the 1920's, but few were produced in the new colors of the 1930's and beyond. The most popular of all Cambridge figure flower holders is the 8.5" Draped Lady. She was produced in more colors than any other figure (crystal, Light Emerald, pink, Willow Blue, Bluebell, Moonlight Blue, Amber, Madeira, Gold Krystol, Ivory, Crown Tuscan and one example in Ebony.) Why were none of the frogs produced in Forest Green, Royal Blue, Carmen or Amethyst? These colors were extremely popular during the 1930's. This eBay Report is provided to keep members up with what's happening on the world's largest Internet Auction site, and focuses on Cambridge glass items that are seldom or rarely seen. Please note we cannot guarantee the accuracy of listings herein.

Welcome to the eBay Report, featuring Cambridge glass items that sold on eBay circa mid- January through mid-February 2023. Selling prices are rounded to the nearest dollar. If no color is mentioned, assume that the piece or part of it being discussed is crystal. If I refer to an auction as "incognito," that means that the seller did not know he or she was offering Cambridge glass, and didn't use the word "Cambridge" in the description. I also mention if a listing was a Buy It Now offering, as opposed to an auction style listing. I think it's important to distinguish between the two, as the price for an auctioned item reflects competitive bidding (or no competition, if it sells for the opening bid.) Here we go:

Statuesque (Nude Stem) and Related Items

A cocktail with Amethyst bowl on a Crown Tuscan stem and foot sold for \$143.

A true cordial with optic bowl sold for \$200 Buy It Now. A true cordial with Amethyst bowl sold for \$225 Buy It Now. The lucky seller had 7 of them, and as of this writing, 4 have sold at that price.

A mint dish with shell-shaped top in Amethyst sold for \$225.

A set of 6 brandies with Forest Green bowls sold for \$228. The seller simply called the color "green" (which of course it is), but it was not the late "Green" color made in the 1950s.

A 10 inch Banquet goblet with Amethyst bowl was offered for \$275 but sold for an undisclosed Best Offer.

An ashtray with Royal Blue top was offered for \$275, and sold for an undisclosed Best Offer.

A covered cigarette box with Carmen top sold for \$390 Buy It Now.

A set of 67-1/2 inch clarets with Forest Green bowls was offered for \$600 but sold for an undisclosed Best Offer.

Etched Tableware and Stemware

A#1623 9 inch footed cornucopia vase with Wildflower etching was offered for \$60 but sold for an undisclosed Best Offer. Most of the time when vases this shape turn up, they are etched Rose Point.



A Tally Ho #1402/94 12 inch oval celery etched Hunt scene sold for \$88.

A #3400/92 32 ounce ball-shaped decanter etched Portia sold for \$160 Buy It Now.

A large Amber Draped Lady figural flower arranger set in a large Decagon rolled edge console bowl etched Rosalie, also Amber, sold for \$175 Buy It Now.

A #1312 footed covered cigarette box etched Valencia sold for \$180 after a flurry of bidding.



A #1000 Decagon 7 inch tall comport in one of the early cobalt blue shades with Cleo etching was offered for \$350, and sold when the seller reduced the price to \$250.

A PeachBlo #1205 64 ounce jug and 4 5-1/4" inch #3130 footed tumblers etched Gloria sold for the \$300 opening bid.



Rose Point etching

A pair of Martha #497 Single Candlesticks (Version 1) with the



arched stem and one prism hanging from the candle socket sold for \$130 Buy It now. The seller didn't mention the Rose Point etching at all; you had to click on the photo to see that the bases were etched.

A set of 9 #498 12 ounce flat soda tumblers were offered for \$580, and sold for an undisclosed Best

Offer.

A Pristine #419 12 inch round 6 compartment relish sold for \$175 Buy It Now.



A set of 8 #3900/115 or -117 tumblers with vertical optic were offered for \$600, and sold for an undisclosed Best Offer. The seller did not state a capacity, but at only 4 inches high, they seem too short to be the 13 ounce 115s, yet too tall to be the -117s that hold only 5 ounces. Readers?

Gold, Silver and Enamel Decorations

A set of 4 #1402/100 Tally Ho 6 inch tall sherbets with Amber bowl and gold silk screen decoration #D1007 were offered for \$50, but sold for an undisclosed Best Offer.



A set of 4 #1402/100 Tally Ho 6-3/4 inch water goblets with Carmen bowls sporting the gold decoration #D1007 was offered for \$125, and sold for an undisclosed Best Offer.

A Crown Tuscan #3500/42 12 inch urn Rose Point advertising lamp with lid sold for \$600 Buy It Now.

A #253 Caprice 4-1/2 inch blown ball-shaped vase with slender top opening sold for the opening bid of \$150. The seller measured it at 5 inches; perhaps Cambridge measured by the width.



An Amber Tally Ho #1403/39 10 inch top hat vase sold for \$150 Buy It Now. These are most often seen in Royal Blue, Carmen, Forest Green, and Amethyst, so it was nice to see one in a color that makes the ringed pattern more visible.

A 9 inch tall comport style covered candy with honeycomb optic in Rubina sold for \$165 Buy It Now. This one had an interesting shading, in that the base was red with some orange, while the lid had mostly just the blue and green shading. Together, it represents the full Rubina spectrum, though.



Miscellaneous



A pair of 1 inch Square candleholders in Ebony sold for \$40 Buy It Now.




A souvenir paperweight from Cambridge Old Home Week October 2-8th, 1921 sold for a very reasonable \$45 Buy It Now. Apparently I think more highly of these than most Cambridge glass collectors, as a few have been offered on eBay and they don't sell quickly, or for very much. Are there more of them out there than I realize?

A Forest Green Mt. Vernon #135 11 inch oval handled bowl sold for the \$75 opening bid. I had never seen one of these before.



A peg Blue Jay for the Cambridge Arms set sold for \$70 Buy It Now, while another brought \$79 Buy It Now. The average sale price for these in the last few years has been around \$50, so it was interesting to see two sell for well over that number.





A PeachBlo #1108 Mandolin Lady figural flower arranger on a #823 4-candle centerpiece base with a cut decoration strummed away for \$125 Buy It Now. The seller noted a chip on the base of the frog, and on the opening where it fits into the base.



A #1066 Aurora footed covered candy in Carmen sold for \$175 Buy It Now.

A Ram's Head footed bowl in Light Emerald Green sold for \$185 Buy It Now.





A Moonlight Blue Caprice #179 32 ounce ball jug and 4#180 5 ounce tumblers with the Alpine treatment sold for \$192.

An 18-piece luncheon set in Heatherbloom Mount Vernon consisting of 6 luncheon plates and 6 cup & saucers sold for \$220.

A pair of #5 Everglades or #1210 Leaf Line 2-piece flower holders (single candleholders with the leaf-shaped insert vases) were offered for \$278, and sold for an undisclosed Best Offer. I'm always amazed when I see that the insert vases have survived for what, 90 years?


Membership Corner

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


